USA Basketball Today

Based in Colorado Springs, Colo., USA Basketball is a nonprofit organization and the national governing body for men's and women's basketball in the United States. As the recognized governing body for basketball in the United States by the International Basketball Federation (FIBA) and the United States Olympic Committee (USOC), USA Basketball is responsible for the selection, training and fielding of USA teams that compete in FIBA sponsored international basketball competitions, as well as for some national competitions.

Actually, USA Basketball is an organization made up of associations. Current USA Basketball active members include the Amateur Athletic Union (AAU); Continental Basketball Association (CBA); National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC); National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA); National Basketball Association (NBA); National Basketball Association Development League; National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA); National Federation of High Schools (NFHS); National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA); National Pro-Am City Leagues

Association (NPA-CLA); National Wheelchair Basketball Association (NWBA); United States Armed Forces; USA Deaf Sports Federation (USADSF); Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA); and the Women's National Basketball Association (WNBA). These 15 member organizations have representation on USA Basketball's Board of Directors and various committees, and ultimately determine how USA Basketball operates.

USA Basketball



was organized in 1974 and known as the Amateur Basketball Association of the United States of America (ABAUSA). The name change to USA Basketball occurred Oct. 12, 1989, shortly after FIBA modified its rules to allow professional basketball players to participate in international competitions. USA Basketball then admitted the NBA as an active member and made the change.

USA Basketball is governed by a 10-member Executive Committee and 25-member Board of Directors, who are appointed and elected by active members. Val Ackerman, founding President of the WNBA, serves as President of USA Basketball for the 2005-

2008 term. Vice President is James Delany, Commissioner of the Big Ten Conference; Vice President for Senior Men is Stu Jackson, NBA Senior Vice President, Basketball Operations; Vice President for Senior Women is Reneé Brown, WNBA Chief of Basketball Operations and Player Relations; Vice President For Men is Reggie Minton, 1993 USA World University Games head coach and Associate Executive Director of the NABC, and Vice President For Women is Chris Plonsky, University of Texas Women's Athletics Director and Director of Men's/Women's Athletics External Services. Robert Kanaby, Executive Director of the National Federation of High Schools and Terry Holland, current East Carolina University Director of Athletics and former chair of 2000-2004 USA Basketball Men's Collegiate Committee, serve as Treasurer and Secretary, respectively, while 1995 Pan American Games team member Scott Paddock and three-time Olympic gold medalist (1996, 2000, 2004) Dawn Staley, are the athlete representatives. Serving since January 2001 as USA Basketball's Executive Director is Jim Tooley, who has been with USA Basketball since 1993.

During the 2001-2004 quadrennium, over 925 men and women players and 125 coaches participated in USA Basketball, including the now biannual USA Basketball men's and women's Youth Development Festivals, USA Basketball trials, and USA Basketball teams. Between 2001-2004 the USA competed in 22 major international events and won medals an astounding 19 times, including gold or top finishes 14 times, silver once and bronze medals four times.

The competitions in which USA teams regularly compete include the Olympics, World Championships, Pan American Games, World University Games, men's and women's U21 World Championships, men's and women's U19 World Championships, Hoop Summit and USA Basketball Youth

Development Festivals.

USA Basketball also sanctions U.S. basketball team tours of foreign countries and foreign basketball team tours of the U.S., as well as oversees the certification of FIBA and USA Basketball officials and the assignment of those officials to international competitions, and the licensing of players to play professionally overseas.

A brief synopsis of the various competitions which USA Basketball teams participate in includes:

Olympic Games

Men's and women's Olympic basketball competition is held every four years (2008, 2012, etc.). The USA men have captured the gold in 12 of the 15 Olympics they have competed in and compiled an incredible 114-5 record. The USA women have earned the gold in five of the past six Olympics and overall boast of a sterling 42-3 record. Beijing, China, is the site of the 2008 Games.

FIBA World Championships

Men's and women's competition is held every four years at the FIBA World Championships (2010, 2014, etc.). Unlike the Olympics at which 12 teams participate, 24 countries compete in the World Championship for Men and 16 teams participate in the World Championship for Women. In basketball circles, the World Championship title is considered as prestigious as the Olympic title. The USA men compiled an 8-1 record to capture the bronze medal at the 2006 World Championship in Japan, while the USA women also claimed bronze with an 8-1 record. The next World Championship competition is scheduled for 2010 in Turkey for the men, and at a site to be determined for the women.

U21 FIBA World Championships

Initiated in 1993 as the FIBA 22-And-Under World Championship and designed for men 22-years-old or younger, FIBA lowered the age eligibility to 21 years of age or younger in December 1998 and the competition is now known as the FIBA U21 World Championship. The USA men finished in fifth place in 2005 with a 7-1 mark. FIBA in 2003 initiated a women's U21 World Championship and the USA women claimed the gold, finishing 7-1 in Sibenik, Croatia. The next FIBA U21 World Championship for women is scheduled for 2007. The selections of the players and coaches are made by the USA Basketball Collegiate Committee.

Pan American Games

Started in 1951 for men and 1955 for women, the Pan American Games are held every four years (2007, 2011, etc.) in the year preceding the Olympics. Only countries from FIBA Americas are eligible to compete. The USA men have compiled

an impressive 81-11 overall record, winning eight of a possible 14 gold medals, while the USA women have won six of 12 gold medals and rolled up a 67-12 record. The 2007 Pan American Games is slated to take place in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil.

World University Games

The World University Games are held for men and women every two years (2007, 2009, etc.), only current university student-athletes or recent graduates are eligible. In 2005 both the USA men's and women's teams went undefeated to capture gold. The 2007 World University Games are scheduled for Bangkok, Thailand. The selections of the players and coaches are made by the USA Basketball Collegiate Committees.

U19 World Championships / Junior National Teams

USA Basketball also fields men's and women's national teams for players 19-years-old or younger. FIBA holds U19 World Championships every two years (2007 for men and women). USA Basketball also fields teams featuring players 18-years-old or younger for FIBA Americas Zone qualifying tournaments. The selections of the players and coaches are made by the USA Basketball Collegiate Committees.

Nike Hoop Summit

The Nike Hoop Summit is the country's premiere annual basketball game featuring America's top boy high school players taking on a World Select Team comprised of top players 19-years-old or younger from around the world. Played each April, the USA enjoys a 8-2 series lead. First contested in 1995, the 2008 Hoop Summit will be played at a site to be determined in April.

USA Basketball Youth Development Festivals

Held annually for men between 1998-2005 and between 2002-05 for women, USA Basketball's Youth Development Festival is an entry-level event that combines competition with off-court educational seminars. Because the U18 National Teams, which now will be fielded every other year, are comprised of the same age group as the Festival, USA Basketball moved the Festival from an annual event to one which will be held biannually in odd-numbered years. Both the men's and women's Youth Development Festivals in 2007 were held in June at the U.S. Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs, Colo. The player and coach selections are made by the USA Basketball Junior Development Committees.

The 2007 USA Basketball Pan American Games Team Trials will be utilized to select finalists for the USA Pan American Games squad. It is expected that finalists for the team will continue to train from July 15-21.

The official 12-member USA Pan American Games Team will participate in the 2007 Pan American Games. Eight teams are participating in the '07 Pan Ams (see page 10 for the Pan American Games schedule).

USA BASKETBALL TESTED

REPRESENTING

Ten separate conferences have players involved in the trials, with the Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC) and Big East Conference heading the list with six players each; the Pacific-10 Conference and the Southeastern Conference (SEC) each have five players; the Big 12 and the Big Ten Conference have three players; and the Atlantic 10 Conference, Conference USA, Colonial Athletic Association, and Missouri Valley Conference all have one player participating in the trials.

Twenty-five universities feature players in the trials, with Marquette featuring three, while Alabama, Duke, Kansas, Oregon and Washington State boast of a pair of players each;

Georgetown, Indiana, LSU, Maryland, Memphis, Michigan State, North Carolina, North Carolina State, Saint Joseph's, Southern Illinois, Syracuse, Tennessee, Texas A&M, Vanderbilt, Villanova, Virginia, Virginia Commonwealth, Washington and Wisconsin have one each.

Born Dec. 22, 1984, Brian Butch at 22 years old is the Trials oldest participant....Wayne Ellington is the youngest participant, born Nov. 29, 1987, he checks in at 19 years old.

WHO DOES THE PICKING?

The USA Basketball Men's Collegiate Committee is responsible not only for selection of the players invited to the Trials, but for the selection of USA Pan American Games Team finalists. Chaired by Syracuse University head coach Jim Boeheim, the committee also includes Bob Burchard (NAIA), Fran Dunphy (NCAA), Tom Izzo (NCAA), Ernie Kent (NCAA), Scott Schumacher (NJCAA), Bill Self (NABC), Tubby Smith (NCAA), Steve Wojciechowski (Athlete Representative) and A.J. Wynder (Athlete Representative).

FLASHBACK 2003 PAN AMERICAN GAMES

Featuring a roster of collegians who competed primarily against older and more internationally experienced senior national teams, the 2003 USA Men's Pan American Games Team was in every game until the final buzzer, but suffered three narrow defeats in five games to place fourth at the 2003 Pan American Games in Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic.

Coached by Michigan State University's Tom Izzo, the U.S. squad comprised of collegians posted a 2-3 record, losing its three games by one, six, and 12 points in a game the U.S. led by two with just over four minutes left.

Brazil won the gold medal for a second consecutive Pan Am Games after blowing out host Dominican Republic 89-62.

A HISTORY LESSON ON USA TEAMS IN THE PAN AMERICAN GAMES

The Americans have earned a medal in 12 of their 14 Pan Am Games appearances, including a record eight golds, as well as three silvers and one bronze. The U.S. men currently own an

81-11 (.880 winning percentage) all-time mark at the Pan Am Games.

Held since 1951, the USA dominated the first five Pan Am Games, earning five consecutive golds. At the 1971 Pan Ams, despite a record of 2-1 in the preliminary round, the USA did not advance to the medal round and for the first time in Pan American history did not win the gold medal. However, the United States rebounded for a 26-0 record over the next three Pan Am Games and captured its last Pan Am gold in 1983. The gold has eluded the U.S. in the past five Games, with the Americans earning three silvers (1987, 1995 and 1999), and a bronze medal (1991).

Many USA Basketball athletes who have been selected to a Pan American Games team have gone on to compete in the Olympic Games, while numerous others enjoyed stellar professional careers. In all, 34 Pan Am athletes have been a member of a U.S. Olympic squad, including Ernie Grunfeld; Grant Hill; Luscious Jackson; Michael Jordan; Christian Laettner; Danny Manning; Chris Mullin; Emeka Okafor; Sam Perkins; Oscar Robertson; David Robinson; Isiah Thomas; Jerry West; and Jo Jo White.

While the list of former Pan American Games players is impressive, the list of USA head coaches is equally striking. The list of head coaches of USA Pan American Games teams includes: Tom Izzo (2003); Mo McHone (1999); Mike Thibault (1995); Gene Keady (1991); Denny Crum (1987); Jack Hartman (1983); Bob Knight (1979); Marv Harshman (1975); Jim Gudger (1971); Hal Fischer (1967); Garland Pinholster (1963); Fred Schaus (1959); Lt. Norman Pilgrim (1955); and Hal Fischer and John Longfellow (1951).

THE LOWDOWN ON THE MEN'S PAN AMERICAN GAMES

The Pan American Games, held every four years in the year prior to the Olympics and organized by the Pan American Sports Organization (PASO), is a multi-sport competition open to men and women representing countries from North, South and Central America and the Caribbean.

The 2007 Pan American Games will be held July 13-29 in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, with the men's basketball competition slated for July 25-29.

The USA Pan American Games squad has been placed in preliminary round Group A along with Argentina, Panama and Uruguay, and Group B consists of Brazil, Canada, Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands. The U.S. opens preliminary play July 25 facing Uruguay (10 p.m. Rio de Janeiro local time), then meets Panama on July 26 (7:45 p.m. Rio de Janeiro local time) and the U.S. closes out preliminary round action against Argentina on July 27 (7:45 p.m. Rio de Janeiro local time). Semifinals will be held on July 28 and the finals will be played July 29.

JAY WRIGHT

2007 USA Men's Pan American Games Team Head Coach

Named May 24, 2007, head coach of the USA Pan American Games Team, Jay Wright is making his third appearance on a USA Basketball coaching staff. Head coach of the 2005 USA World University Games Team that won the gold medal in Izmir, Turkey, Wright's USA team was dominant in amassing an 8-0 record by an average margin of victory of 29.9 points per game. For his efforts Wright was named the 2005 USA Basketball Co-Developmental Coach of the Year. Wright was also an assistant coach for the 2000 World Championship For Young Men Qualifying Tournament, where the U.S. earned its 2001 FIBA World Championship For Young Men berth, and finished with a 4-1 record and in possession of the silver medal.

A 13-year head coach at Villanova (2001-02 to present) and Hofstra University (N.Y.) (1994-95 through 2000-01), Wright has tallied an overall slate of 248-155 (.615 winning percentage), and advanced teams to postseason play in each of the last nine seasons, including five NCAA Tournaments and four National Invitational Tournaments (NIT).

Under Wright's tutelage, Villanova has appeared in each of the last three NCAA Tournaments, advancing to the Elite Eight in 2006 and Sweet 16 in 2005 (in both years they were eliminated by the eventual NCAA national champion). In that span he has amassed a striking record of 74-24 (.755 winning percentage), and captured three Philadelphia Big Five crowns and a Big East Conference regular season championship (2006).

In 2006-07, Wright's Wildcats recorded a 22-11 campaign, winning seven of their last nine regular season games to earn an at-large bid to the 2007 NCAA Tournament. The 'Cats also extended their school record Philadelphia Big Five winning streak to 11 straight with a perfect 4-0 record against their City Series rivals (LaSalle, Pennsylvania, St. Joseph's and Temple).

The 2005-06 season was one of the most memorable campaigns in the annals of Villanova basketball. Despite the October loss of All-Big East forward Curtis Sumpter to season-ending knee surgery, Wright's squad finished 28-5, the most wins in school history, while earning a share of the Big East

Conference regular season title. Villanova spent the entire season ranked in the top 10 of both the Associated Press and USA Today/ESPN polls, climbing as high as No. 2 in February. The Wildcats were rewarded with the first NCAA Tournament No. 1 seed in the program's history and advanced to the Elite Eight for the first time since 1988.

Wright's efforts were rewarded when he earned national coach of the year honors from CBS/Chevrolet; the Naismith Awards; and the National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC). Wright was also named Big East Coach of the Year and earned the Harry Litwack Award as the Eastern College Coach of the Year from the Herb Good Club in Philadelphia.

Wright in 2004-05 guided the Wildcats to a 24-8 mark and the NCAA Sweet Sixteen, where they were narrowly edged by eventual national champion North Carolina. The Wildcats finished the year ranked No. 13 in the ESPN/USA Today Coaches Poll and Wright capped the season as the 2005 Philadelphia Big Five Coach of the Year.

In his first three years at Villanova's helm Wright, who returned to the Wildcats after acting as a five-year (1987-88 through 1991-92) assistant coach, posted a 52-46 record (.531 winning percentage) and competed in a trio of NITs, advancing to the 2002 and 2004 NIT quarterfinals. His overall Villanova record currently stands at 126-70 (.643 winning percentage).

Wright spent his first seven years as a head coach on the Hofstra sidelines and compiled a 122-85 record (.589 winning percentage). During his first two years he rebuilt a program that had posted just one winning season in the previous eight years.

MARK GOTTFRIED

2007 USA Men's Pan American Games Team Assistant Coach

"I think it's just a tremendous honor. To represent your country is such a privilege, and to be around the best players in the nation as well is going to be a lot of fun. I've always respected USA Basketball. I have been a fan of international play, and I am extremely excited about this opportunity," said Gottfried.

Gottfried, who is making his first appearance on the sidelines for USA Basketball, was named the University of Alabama's head coach on March 25, 1998, and in nine seasons (1989-99 through 2006-07) has directed 'Bama to a 181-108 record (.626 winning percentage), while capturing one Southeastern Conference (SEC) title (2002) and making five NCAA and three NIT tournaments.

Having led the Tide to 20 or more wins in five of Alabama's past seven seasons, in 2006-07 his squad ran up a 20-12 overall record and earned a NIT appearance, Alabama's seventh consecutive postseason appearance. Finishing 18-13 and advancing to the NCAA Tournament second round in 2005-06, the 2004-05 campaign saw the Tide tally a 24-8 record, tie for first in the SEC West and make another NCAA Tournament appearance. Advancing to the NCAA Final eight in 2003-04 and compiling a 20-13 overall mark, 2002-03 saw Alabama earn another NCAA Tournament appearance.

Gottfried's 2001-02 'Bama team was his most successful team to date. Rolling to a 27-8 record while outright taking the SEC regular season title, Alabama advanced to the NCAA Tournament second round. His 2002 team set a school record for single season home wins with a perfect 17-0 mark. For his effort, Gottfried was named the 2002 Associated Press and coaches' SEC Coach of the Year; and the 2002 NABC District 6 Coach of the Year.

Rebuilding his first two seasons at Alabama, Gottfried's team in year three, 2000-01, finished 25-11 and advanced to the NIT championship game.

Prior to his arrival in Tuscaloosa, Gottfried served as the head coach at Murray State University (Ky.) for three seasons (1995-96 through 1997-98), his teams posted a collective mark of 68-24 for a sterling 73.9 winning percentage. Compiling

records of 19-10 in 1995-96, 20-10 in 1996-97, and 29-4 in 1997-98, Murray State advanced to the NCAA tournament in 1997 and again in 1998, and made the NIT in his first season there in 1996. Gottfried became the first Ohio Valley Conference (OVC) coach to win three OVC titles in only three seasons. Additionally, MSU had 30-game home win streak when Gottfried left for Alabama.



Gottfried got his start in college coaching as a graduate assistant and as an assistant coach at UCLA, spending seven seasons (1988-89 through 1994-95) there. While at UCLA he helped the Bruins amass a 168-55 record (.753 winning percentage) that included seven NCAA appearances and the 1995 NCAA national championship.

Also a standout basketball player, Gottfried attended Oral Roberts University on a basketball scholarship his freshman season (1982-83) and earned Freshman All-America honors. Transferring to Alabama, he collected Academic All-Southeastern Conference honors and was named the recipient of Alabama's 1986 Bryant Award as the top Alabama scholar-athlete. Starting 98 consecutive games, he helped the Tide from 1984-85 through 1986-97 compile a 75-24 record and reach the NCAA Tournament "Sweet 16" in all three seasons. Averaging 10.3 ppg. as a senior, Alabama concluded the 1986-87 season with a 28-5 record, and captured the SEC regular season and tournament championships. Drafted by the Detroit Pistons in the seventh round of the 1987 NBA Draft, he toured internationally with Athletes in Action in 1987-88 and returned in 1989 to coach a summer tour in Poland and Greece with an AIA team that finished 10-3.

JAMES JONES

2007 USA Men's Pan American Games Team Assistant Coach

"I'm extremely proud to have been selected as an assistant coach to this year's Pan Am Games. It is such an honor to represent the USA and work with some of the best coaches and players the world has to offer," Jones said.

The 2007 Pan American Games assignment is Jones' second coaching experience with USA Basketball. He was previously selected by the USA Basketball Men's Collegiate Committee as a court coach for the 2006 USA Men's U18 National Team Trials.

Jones has made quite an impact on the Yale basketball program. In eight seasons (1999-2000 through 2006-07), Jones has guided Yale to success not seen in New Haven in 40 years.

Jones, the longest tenured coach in the Ivy League, earned his 100th victory at Yale when the Bulldogs beat Columbia on Feb. 9, 2007. He is only the fourth coach in school history with at least 100 wins. His overall record at Yale is 104-119, including a 62-50 (.554) mark in Ivy games. The Bulldogs have won at least 10 Ivy games twice during his tenure and have had a .500 or better record in league play in each of the last seven years, which hasn't happened at Yale since the official start of Ivy play in 1956-57.

In 2001-02, Jones led the Bulldogs to their first Ivy League title since 1962-63 and the first postseason tournament victory in the 107-year history of Yale basketball. The team won 21 games, the second most in the modern era of Yale basketball, and reached the second round of the National Invitation Tournament. Jones' success did not go unnoticed. He was named the Ivy League Coach of the Year by Basketball America and CollegeInsider.com. Following Yale's weekend sweep of Penn and Princeton, Dick Vitale selected Jones as his Coach of the Week.

Jones was named Yale's 22nd head coach on April 27, 1999, and he immediately put his stamp on the program as the Bulldogs more than doubled their Division I win total from the previous season and improved to fifth place in the Ivy League. In 2000-2001 the turnaround continued as Yale entered the final weekend of the regular season in the hunt for the Ivy League championship.

In the 2001-02, Jones guided the Bulldogs to one of the most memorable seasons in school history. Yale finished 21-11 and earned a share of the Ivy title with Penn and Princeton. The Bulldogs upset Rutgers in the first round of the NIT before falling to Tennessee Tech. In the process the Bulldogs set school records for points scored (2394), 3-pointers made (228) and attempted (671), and for most free throws made (558) and attempted (796).



Jones spent two seasons (1995-96 and 1996-97) as an assistant coach at Yale and was also an assistant at Ohio University for two years (1997-98 and 1998-99).

Jones got his start in college coaching as an assistant coach at his alma mater, the University at Albany (N.Y.). In his five seasons (1990-91 to 1994-95) at Albany, the Great Danes tallied a 93-40 overall record (.699 winning percentage) and made three appearances in the NCAA Division III Tournament. In his final two seasons coaching at Albany, he assisted teams to a 43-11 record (.796 winning percentage). Albany's 1993-94 squad finished the year 25-3 and reached the NCAA Division III Tournament Elite Eight.

Jones graduated from Albany in 1986 and in 1995 earned his master's. As a player at Albany, Jones was captain of the freshman team and was selected as the team's Freshman of the Year. He played for and coached with the legendary Dr. Richard Sauer, one of only seven collegiate coaches to win more than 700 games.

2007 MEN'S PAN AMERICAN GAMES TEAM TRIALS

Kim Anderson

The only coach in school history to win at least 24 games in three consecutive years, Anderson has tallied a 110-44 overall record (.714 winning percentage) in five seasons (2002-03 to present) at the University of Central Missouri.

Most recently in 2006-07, Anderson led the Mules to a 31-4 mark, setting the school record for wins and advancing to the NCAA Division II Final Four for just the second time in program history. Central Missouri also captured the MIAA regular season and tournament titles and hosted the Division II South Central Regional Championship. More than 6,300 fans watched Anderson and his squad cut down the nets as regional champions for the first time since 1995.

The Mules are 44-3 at home the last three seasons, including a perfect 18-0 mark in 2006-07.

Anderson led his 2005-06 squad to a 24-8 tally, a second place finish in the MIAA (11-5) and the program's first NCAA Division II Tournament win since 1996.

The 2005 Wilson/MIAA Coach of the Year, Anderson helped the 2004-05 Mules to a 24-7 record, a share of the program's first regular season conference title since 1985 and the first conference tournament crown since 1984.

Prior to UCM, Anderson was assistant commissioner of the Big 12 Conference for two seasons. He was originally hired by the Big 12 in July of 1999 and served as the Director of Basketball Operations.



Anderson also served as an assistant coach (1991 to 1999) and graduate assistant (1982 to 1985) at his alma mater, the University of Missouri. During his tenures there, he helped the program capture two Big Eight Conference regular season titles (1983 and 1994), a Big 8 Tournament title (1993) and six trips to the NCAA Tournament, including an Elite Eight appearance in 1994.

Anderson spent six seasons (1985-1991) as an assistant on the Baylor University (Texas) sideline, helping the 1988 squad to its first NCAA Tournament berth in 38 years.

Anderson was a two-time all-state selection at Smith-Cotton High School (Mo.), and he went on to play four seasons (1973-74 to 1976-77) of college basketball at Missouri. The Big 8 Player of the Year and the league's leading scorer in 1977, Anderson helped Missouri capture a conference title in 1976. He was named to the Academic All-Big 8 team in 1975 and 1977 and was a three-time George Edwards Award winner. With 1,289 career points, he ranks among Missouri's top-20 all-time scorers.

Anderson was a second round selection of the Portland Trail Blazers in the 1977 NBA Draft. He played for the Trail Blazers during the 1978-79 season and also played professionally in Italy and France for three seasons.

Anderson has been inducted into the University of Missouri Athletic Department Hall of Fame and the Missouri Basketball Hall of Fame (which now is the Missouri Sports Hall of Fame), and his high school basketball jersey was retired at Smith-Cotton. Anderson received his bachelor's and master's degrees in education from Missouri in 1979 and 1981, respectively.

Fran O'Hanlon

In 12 seasons (1995-96 to present) at Lafayette, O'Hanlon has tallied a 171-173 overall record. He has helped the Leopards reach two NCAA Tournaments and capture three regular season league titles while twice earning Patriot League Coach of the Year honors.

While other teams in the Patriot League have been awarding athletic scholarships since 1998, Lafayette welcomed in 2006-07 its first class of scholarship athletes since joining the Patriot League in 1990.

O'Hanlon inherited a program that had won just two games in the previous season when he accepted the head coaching position at Lafayette on March 13, 1995. In his first season at the helm, he improved Lafayette's record to seven wins and then to 11 games in 1996-97, reaching double-digit wins for the first time since 1990.

O'Hanlon continued to build the program, winning his first Patriot League Coach of the Year honor in 1997-98, when his squad won 19 games and captured a share of the regular season conference title.

He earned a second consecutive conference Coach of the Year title, the first Patriot League coach ever to do so, after leading his 1998-99 squad to a 22-8 record, a regular season conference title, the program's first ever conference tournament crown and a berth into the NCAA Tournament.

O'Hanlon led Lafayette to the most wins in program history, 24, in 1999-00 and captured a third straight regular season league title and a second consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance.

In 2001-02 and 2003-04, Lafayette finished third in the Patriot League and advanced to the league's tournament semifinals in 2002 and 2003. O'Hanlon recorded his 100th career win on Dec. 19, 2001, and he



was awarded the Patriot League's Sportsmanship Award in 2003.

Prior to Lafayette, O'Hanlon was an assistant coach at the University of Pennsylvania for six seasons (1989-90 to 1994-95). With his help, the Quakers earned three consecutive NCAA Tournament berths and recorded a perfect 42-0 record in Ivy League play from 1992-93 to 1994-95.

O'Hanlon also spent three seasons (1986-87 to 1988-89) as the head coach at Monsignor Bonner High School (Pa.). A two-time Catholic League Coach of the Year, he compiled an overall record of 36-23 (.610 winning percentage) and led Bonner to the Philadelphia Catholic League Tournament in each of his three seasons, winning the league title in 1988.

In 1983-84 and 1984-85, O'Hanlon served as the head men's coach for Hapoel Haifa and Maccabi Haifa in the Israel Professional League, and was twice tabbed Coach of the Year.

A 1970 graduate of Villanova University, O'Hanlon averaged 13.1 ppg. and served as team co-captain for the 1969-70 Wildcat squad that reached the NCAA Tournament quarterfinals. O'Hanlon still holds the Villanova school record for assists in a game (16 vs. Toledo, 1969-70) and finished his collegiate career with 689 points. He was inducted into the Villanova Hall of Fame in 1992.

Selected in the eighth round of the 1970 NBA draft by the Philadelphia 76ers, O'Hanlon played with the Miami Floridians of the American Basketball Association for one season before journeying overseas. He played for the Hageby Basketball Club in Sweden for seven seasons, while coaching its farm team.

Following his time in Sweden, O'Hanlon took over coaching duties for Panteras De Lara in Barquisimeto, Venezuela, in 1982, where his squad captured the Division I league title.

Steve Ridder

A USA Basketball newcomer, Ridder has tallied an overall record of 427-173 (.712 winning percentage) in 18 seasons (1989-90 to present) at Embry-Riddle.

Under Ridder's reign, the Eagles have captured one NAIA national championship, competed in nine NAIA Tournaments, including consecutive appearances from 1996 through 2001, and secured seven Florida Sun Conference (FSC) regular season titles and seven league tournament crowns.

In 2006-07, Ridder led the Eagles to a 24-9 record and the title game of the FSC tournament.

Following a first season that included just four victories in 1989-90, Ridder orchestrated the biggest turnaround in NAIA men's basketball history winning 22 games in 1990-91. Since then, he has posted 14 20-win seasons and three 30-win campaigns (2000, 2001 and 2006).

In 1999-00, the Eagles claimed the program's first ever NAIA national championship, earning Ridder NAIA National Coach of the Year honors. The following season, 2000-01, the Eagles secured the most wins in program history with a 32-4 record, ranking No. 1 in the NAIA national poll the entire season.

In 2005-06, Ridder guided the Eagles back to the NAIA Tournament for a second consecutive year posting the best winning percentage in Eagle history at 91.1 (31-3), and the Eagles maintained



the No. 1 ranking in the NAIA national poll for the final eight weeks of the season.

Ridder also has served as the Director of Athletics at Embry-Riddle since 1993-94. He received the highest honor of NAIA Athletics Director of the Year in 2005-06 and was recognized at the NAIA Convention. In addition, he was named the NACDA-NAIA Southeast Region Athletic Director of the Year in 1995 and 2003.

In 2004-05, Steve and his wife, Vicky, were honored with the establishment of the Steve and Vicky Ridder Endowed Scholarship, awarded annually to a student-athlete who best represents Ridder's philosophy of "The Total Package: Student, Person, Player."

Prior to Embry-Riddle, Ridder was an athlete and assistant coach at Berea College (Ky.). He spent four years (1977-78 to 1980-81) on the roster and eight (1981-82 to 1988-89) on the sidelines. In 1996, he returned to his alma mater to receive the Berea College "Distinguished Young Alumnus Award."

Ridder earned his master's degree from Eastern Kentucky University and his bachelor's degree from Berea. For four years he served on the NAIA Division II Basketball National Tournament Committee, and he currently serves as the president of the FSC.

In 1994 Ridder traveled to Belgium and in 1997 to Switzerland to conduct basketball clinics and assist with the World Challenge Basketball program. He also conducts the Embry-Riddle/Steve Ridder Basketball Camps.

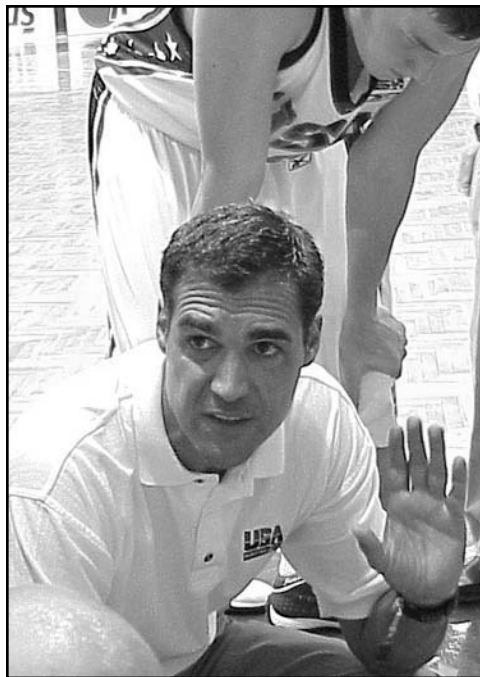
Ridder was inducted into the Northern Kentucky Hall of Fame in 2004 and the Bellevue High School Hall of Fame in 2005.

In his third season, 1996-97, Hofstra finished 12-15 overall and in fourth place in the America East Conference with a 9-9 record. After closing 1998 with a 19-12 record, Wright propelled Hofstra in 1999 into the National Invitational Tournament, the school's first post-season tournament in 21 years, as his squad posted a 22-10 record.

Wright led Hofstra in 1999-2000 to a stellar 24-7 record and a 16-2 conference record to snag the regular season America East title. He went on to guide Hofstra to the America East Tournament crown and a berth in the NCAA Tournament - the program's third such appearance since entering NCAA Division I competition in the 1972-73 season, and just the seventh since the inception of Hofstra's basketball program in the 1936-37 season. Wright's coaching accomplishments did not go unnoticed by his peers as he was honored as the 2000 America East Coach of the Year and was also tabbed *Eastern Basketball's Coach of the Year*.

His final season at Hofstra saw the 2000-01 squad post a 26-5 record, collect the America East regular season and tournament championships, advance to the NCAA Tournament and Wright earned his second America East Coach of the Year

award.

Academic success has also been a key component of Wright's coaching career. Every player who has spent four years with Wright's programs at Villanova and Hofstra has earned his college degree.

Prior to assuming the reigns at Hofstra, Wright spent 10 years (1984-85 through 1993-94) as an assistant coach at four different universities, including two years at the University of Nevada-Las Vegas (1992-93 and 1993-94), five years at Villanova, one-year at Drexel.

University (Pa.) (1986-87) and he began his coaching career with two years (1984-85 and 1985-86) at the University of Rochester (N.Y.). As an assistant, Wright aided six of his last seven teams to postseason play, including three NCAA Tournaments (1988, 1990 and 1991) and three NITs (1989, 1992 and 1993).

A 1983 graduate of Bucknell University (Pa.), Wright was a four-year letterwinner as a member of Bucknell's basketball

team. He was honored as his team's Benton A. Kribbs award winner for the most outstanding contribution as a junior in 1982 and named as a co-recipient of the team's Malcom E. Musser leadership award as a senior in 1983.
