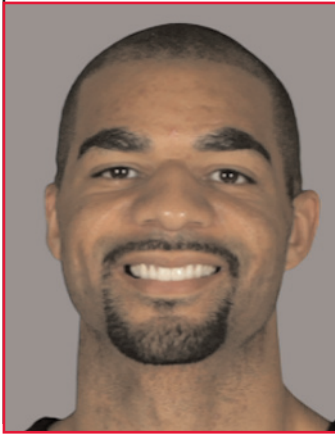


#4 CARLOS BOOZER

USA BASKETBALL NOTES



- Was unable to participate in the 2007 USA Senior National Team mini-training camp in Las Vegas because of personal reasons.
- Added on May 23, 2007, to the USA Basketball Men's Senior National Team.
- As a member of the 2004 U.S. Olympic basketball team that finished 5-3 and won the bronze medal, played in seven of the USA's eight games, averaged 7.6 ppg. and 6.1 rpg.

- Member of the 2004 USA Men's Senior National Team that compiled a 5-1 record in its pre-Olympic training, played in all six games, averaged a team third best 6.5 ppg. and 3.2 rpg.
 - A starter in all eight games for the 2001 USA Basketball World Championship For Young Men Team and helped lead the United States to an 8-0 record and the gold medal in Japan.
 - Averaged team highs of 15.9 ppg., 8.0 rpg., and shot a sizzling 66.3 percent from the floor and 77.8 percent from the foul line.
 - Had a huge game in the USA's 95-90 win over Argentina in the semifinals, accounting for 29 points (7-10 FGs, 15-17 FTs), nine rebounds in 29 minutes.
 - Also posted 18 point showings in wins over Argentina (84-71) and Croatia (88-69) in preliminary play, and had 16 point and 11 rebound performances in wins against Israel and Japan.

NBA HONORS

- Named 2007-08 All-NBA third team, leading vote getter for the third team.
- Named a reserve member of the 2008 NBA All-Star Western Conference Team, recorded 14 points and 10 rebounds in 18:30 of action.
- Named a reserve member of the 2007 NBA All-Star Western Conference Team but did not participate because of an injury.
- Finished second in voting for 2004 Most Improved Player Award.
- Named 2003 NBA All-Rookie second team.
- Named the Western Conference Player of the Month for November 2007.
- Named the Western Conference Player of the Week for Dec. 11-17, 2006; Oct. 31-Nov. 5, 2006; and Eastern Conference NBA Player of the Week for Jan. 19-25, 2004.
- Helped lead the Sophomore squad to a win in the 2004 Challenge during All-Star Weekend and was credited with 25 points (11-14 FGs, 3-3 FTs), five rebounds, two assists in 24 minutes.

- Played for the Rookie Team in the 2003 Rookie Challenge during All-Star Weekend and tallied 11 points, three rebounds, two assists, three steals in 25 minutes of action.

NBA MILESTONES

- Recorded his 3,000th career rebound versus Seattle (4/7/2007).
- Was the only player in the NBA in 2006-07 to record 20 points, 20 rebounds and 5 blocked shots and did it twice.

NBA NOTES

- Completed in 2007-08 his sixth NBA season, fourth with Utah.
- Helped lead Utah in 2007-08 to a 54-28 regular season record, a Western Conference Northwest Division title and the 2008 NBA Playoffs.
- Played and started in 81 games in 2007-08, and averaged a career high 21.1 ppg., 10.4 rpg., 2.9 apg., and 1.2 spg., while shooting 54.7 percent from the floor and 73.8 percent from the foul line.
- Finished 2007-08 ranked sixth in the NBA in double-doubles (51); sixth in defensive rebounds per game (8.0 rpg.); seventh in field goals made (709); eighth in rebounds per game; eighth in efficiency ranking (25.0); ninth in field goal percentage; 17th in field goals attempted (1297); 18th in points per game; 25th in offensive rebounds per game (2.4 rpg.); 31st in steals per game, 31st in free throws attempted (393); 32nd in minutes played; and 39th in free throws made (290).
- Signed a multi-year contract with Utah on July 30, 2004.
- Played in 2003-04 with Cleveland.
- As a rookie in 2002-03, played in 81 games, started 54, and ranked first in field goal percentage (.536), third in rebounding (7.5 rpg.), fifth in blocked shots (0.62 bpg.), eighth in free throw percentage (.771), eighth in scoring (10.0 ppg.), ninth in minutes (25.3 mpg.) and 15th in assists (1.3 apg.).
- Was the only second round selection to rank in the top eight among rookies in scoring, rebounding and shooting percentage.
- Selected in the second round, No. 35 overall, of the 2002 NBA Draft by Cleveland.
- Became an early entry candidate after three collegiate seasons at Duke University.

COLLEGIATE NOTES

- During his three seasons at Duke the Blue Devils compiled a win-loss record of 90-16 for an .849 winning percentage, while winning two Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC) regular season titles, three ACC Tournament championships and making three NCAA Tournaments, winning the NCAA title in 2001 and advancing to the Sweet 16 twice (2000 and 2002).
- Finished his three-year college career ranked as Duke's all-time leader in field goal percentage (.631) and third all-time

in the Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC).

- His 1,506 career points ranks 23rd all-time in Duke scoring.
- Played in 101 games and averaged 14.9 ppg., 7.2 rpg., and shot 74.1 percent from the foul line.
- Scored 12 points and grabbed 12 rebounds in 30 minutes of action in the Duke's 82-72 victory over Arizona in the 2001 NCAA championship game. Finished with 19 points (7-8 FGs) and four rebounds in 25 minutes of action in Duke's 95-84 win over Maryland in the NCAA semifinal.
- As a junior in 2001-02 was named All-America Third Team by The Associated Press, National Association of Basketball Coaches All-American.
- While at Duke earned All-ACC First Team (2002), and All-ACC Freshman Team (2000) honors.

PERSONAL NOTES

- Born on November 20, 1981, in Aschaffenburg, Germany, and grew-up in Juneau, Alaska.
- Son of Charles and Renee' Boozer, has one older sister, Natasha, and three younger siblings, Charles, Nakeisha and Natenya.
- He and his wife, Cindy, have three boys, Carmani and twins Cayden and Cameron who were born in the summer of 2007.
- Was named Alaska's High School Player of the Year three times and led Juneau-Douglas High School to a 95-12 record during his four-year prep career, including two state titles and two state third-place finishes.
