## RULES, RULES, RULES

During the 2007 College Tour, the USA National Team is taking a step back in time and playing using NCAA rules, which include numerous differences between international or WNBA rules. What are some of the major differences? For one thing, internationally the game is played with four 10-minute quarters, there is a wider, trapezoidal lane, an 8-second backcourt violation count and a 24-second shot clock. The international game is also a much more physical style of basketball than the collegiate game. For more differences, see **Page 14**.

## TEXAS CONNECTION

In addition to recent addition Jamie Carey, who played three years for the University of Texas, Lisa Leslie lives in Dallas with her husband, Michael Lockwood, and daughter, Lauren Jolie Lockwood. Leslie, who played her collegiate career at USC and has been a member of the Los Angeles Sparks since the WNBA started in 1997, lived all of her life in the LA area before moving to Texas.

## ELITE GROUP

With the WNBA title under her belt, **Diana Taurasi** enters an elite group that now counts seven U.S. women among its members. It's called the Tri-Fecta Club and includes athletes who have captured an Olympic gold medal, a WNBA title and an NCAA championship. Other members of the club are: Sue Bird, Swin Cash, Cynthia Cooper, Ruth Riley, Sheryl Swoopes and Kara Wolters. If Taurasi returns in 2010 and the U.S. wins gold at the FIBA World Championship she'll join an even more exclusive club of women who have all four honors (Bird, Cooper, Swoopes, Wolters).

### ROSTER CHANGES

Former University of Texas standout Jamie Carey was added to the USA roster for the remainder of its 2007 College Tour. Carey transferred to Texas after competing during the 1999-2000 season for Stanford University and sat out two years with injuries due to post-concussive symptoms prior to arriving on the Austin campus for the 2002-03 season. During her three years at Texas (2003-05), Carey aided the Longhorns to an 81-20 mark, three NCAA Tournaments, including the 2003 Final Four and 2004 Sweet Sixteen, and the 2003 Big 12 Conference Tournament title.

Additionally, Katie Feenstra's final USA College Tour game was against Baylor. Due to a previous commitment, she was only able to compete with the USA squad for the first half of the tour.

### TOP COMPETITION

The USA squad faces seven of the top 15 teams in the nation during its 2007 College Tour, according to the first USA Today/ESPN and Associated Press polls of the 2007-08 season. Opening against No. 4/4 Maryland on Halloween, the USA faced No. 2/2 UConn on Nov. 4, No. 1/1 Tennessee on Nov. 4, No.

15/15 Baylor on Nov. 6 and No. 12/12 Arizona State on Nov. 8. Tonight the squad will see No. 11/11 Texas A&M and the tour ends versus No. 8/7 Stanford on Nov. 15.

## USA COLLEGE TOUR No. 3

This marks the third USA Basketball College Tour. The historic 1995-96 USA National Team went 20-0 against top NCAA programs, while the 1999-2000 USA National Team compiled a mark of 11-1 during its pre-Olympic training.

The only schools on the 2007 tour that the USA previously has faced are Connecticut, Stanford and Tennessee. The '95-96 squad defeated Connecticut 83-47 on Nov. 5, Stanford 100-63 on Nov. 10 and Tennessee 82-58 on Nov. 22; while the 1999-2000 squad downed Stanford 82-58 on Nov. 1 and lost 65-64 at Tennessee following a final bucket by then-Lady Vol freshman Kara Lawson on Nov. 7.

## NO MOORE

Loree Moore, who was on the roster for the 2007 College Tour, did not play again tonight due to a flare-up of a previous left knee aggravation. Moore, who also sat out the final three games during the 2007 FIBA World League Tournament, returned on Nov. 2 to New York to continue treatment and rehabilitation.

## WNBA TITLES

Six of the USA College Tour Team members and USA head coach Anne Donovan have been members of WNBA championship runs. Donovan and Swin Cash, upon returning to the States after the USA's '04 Olympic gold medal run, earned the WNBA title with the Seattle Storm. Kara Braxton (2006) and Swin Cash (2003, 2006) earned their rings with the Detroit Shock, Kara Lawson and the Sacramento Monarchs won the crown in 2005, Lisa Leslie earned a pair of WNBA Finals MVP honors after leading the Sparks to back-to-back championships in 2001 and 2002, and Diana Taurasi helped propel the Phoenix Mercury to the 2007 WNBA title.

## NCAA CHAMPS

All of the members of the 2007 USA College Tour Team were standouts on the collegiate hardwood, however, only four can lay claim to a national title. In addition to USA head coach Anne Donovan, who helped lead Old Dominion to a national championship in 1980, Sue Bird (2000, 2002), Swin Cash (2000, 2002), Diana Taurasi (2002, 2003, 2004) all were a part of NCAA title teams at UConn.

## TICKET TO BEIJING

The USA earned its spot among the 12-nation field for the 2008 Olympic Games by capturing the gold medal at the 2007 FIBA Americas Championship. Held in Valdivia, Chile, Sept. 26-30, the U.S. got off to a winning start with an 85-79 victory over Cuba -- its closest game of the tournament -- and followed that up by demolishing Jamaica 115-47 and Canada 85-37 to close preliminary play with a 3-0 slate. Polishing off Argentina 104-53 in the semifinals, the USA women savored their second shot at Cuba and came away with the 101-71 gold medal win.

Overall the USA outscored opponents 98.0 to 57.4 ppg. and out-rebounded its foes 42.0 to 36.0 rpg. Leading a balanced scoring attack that saw four players post double figure scoring averages and an additional two who averaged no less than nine points a game were the University of Tennessee's Candace Parker and

## CALLING ALL STATS GEEKS: FIBA RANKINGS EXPLAINED

FIBA recalculates its rankings for national teams each time a FIBA World Championship, Olympic Games or a FIBA zone championship has concluded. Each FIBA or FIBA zone event is ranked and countries earn points for finishing from first through 18th places.

The gold medalist receives 50 points, silver is worth 40 and a bronze medalist country gets 30 points. The fourth place finisher is awarded 15 points and each subsequent drop in finish placement earns a country one less point. Therefore, the fifth place finisher is given 14 points, sixth place gets 13 points, etc., through the one point given to the 18th placed team.

Following the points received per placement, the points are then weighted or multiplied based upon the event. The Olympics and FIBA World Championship points are multiplied by five, age-based FIBA World Championships are each multiplied by one, a FIBA Africa Championship by 0.2, a FIBA Americas Championship is weighted at 0.8, the FIBA Asia Championship is weighted at 0.3, the FIBA Europe Championship is a 1.0 and FIBA Oceania Championship is 0.1. Therefore, with the placing points and event ranking system an Olympic gold medal is worth 250 points, while a FIBA Americas Championship is worth 40 points.

The ranking is calculated within the scope of a two Olympic Games cycle and whenever a new championship is played, the points from the oldest such championship is dropped and the FIBA rankings are recalculated. Each cycle includes two Olympics, two FIBA World Championships, two of each age-based World Championships and five zone championships.

Tina Thompson of the Houston Comets, who netted 13.8 ppg. apiece. 2007 WNBA champ Diana Taurasi of the Phoenix Mercury pitched in 11.0 ppg., the Minnesota Lynx' Seimone Augustus contributed 10.6 ppg. coming off the bench, while Katie Smith of the Detroit Shock and Rebekkah Brunson of the Sacramento Monarchs added 9.6 ppg. and 9.0 ppg., respectively.

## OLYMPIC BRAGGING RIGHTS

Tennessee is the only school that can boast of representation on all eight U.S. Women's Olympic squads. Lady Vol Olympic alums include Cindy Brogdon, Tamika Catchings, Daedra Charles, Bridgette Gordon, Lea Henry, Chamique Holdsclaw, Nikki McCray, Carla McGhee, Cindy Noble, Jill Rankin, Patricia Roberts, Pat Summitt (nee Head) and Holly Warlick. With five current and former Lady Vols on the 2007-08 USA Basketball Women's National Team roster, Tennessee's streak should continue through 2008.

### USA 82, Arizona State 48

November 8, 2007 • Tempe, Arizona

Behind a balanced scoring attack that featured six players in double digits, including 14 apiece from Seimone Augustus and Swin Cash, the USA overpowered No. 12 Arizona State 82-48 on Nov. 8.

Aiding in the USA's potent offense, which outscored ASU 48-22 in the second half, were Lisa Leslie with 13 points, Kara Braxton and Kara Lawson each scored 12 and Taj McWilliams-Franklin chipped in 10 points.

The collegians kept pace with the pros and with 7:27 to play in the first half the USA held a 21-20 edge. Diana Taurasi was whistled for a technical foul at the same time Cash was called for a hold. ASU capitalized on the two infractions by collecting its final lead of the game, making 4-of-4 from the line at 6:51 to go up by three, 24-21.

The USA then went inside to McWilliams-Franklin, who scored four straight to put the USA on top for good and spur a 13-2 run, in which she tossed in four more points, to close the half up by eight, 34-26.

Leslie put in six of the squad's first 10 points of the second stanza and with 14:06 to play the National Team owned a 44-30 lead.

Arizona State cut the deficit to 10 points three times and with 10:21 remaining the scoreboard read 50-40. But the USA continued to push the ball up the court in transition and by 7:30 it was suddenly a 20-point game, 60-40.

ASU tried, but couldn't keep up with the vets, who outscored the Sun Devils in all 32-8 over the final 10 minutes of the game.

ASU was led by Briann January's 14 points.

### USA 82, Baylor 56

November 6, 2007 • Waco, Texas

Behind 21 points, 11 rebounds and six assists from Diana Taurasi, the USA ran past No. 15 Baylor University in the second half for an 82-56 victory on Nov. 6. Lisa Leslie notched her second double-double in as many games with 10 points and 11 rebounds as the U.S. marked its largest margin of victory (+26) of the 2007 College Tour.

All five of the USA's starters hit double digits for points as Sue Bird had 14 and Seimone Augustus and Taj McWilliams-Franklin pitched in 12 points apiece.

The USA ran out to a 14-3 lead to open the game. But in what became a foul-plagued first half that saw the U.S. whistled for 11 infractions and commit 12 turnovers, the U.S. trailed Baylor 29-24 with 3:23 to go. Fighting back with the help of a pair of threes, one each from Bird and Taurasi, the USA headed to the locker room holding a 34-33 edge.

Shaking off the first half, the USA took to the court after the break with renewed vigor. Getting five points and an assist from Taurasi and four points and an assist from Leslie, the squad quickly expanded its lead to 43-33 at 16:19. The USA went up to as many as 15 points, but with 9:11 left Baylor's Rachel Allison made it a 12-point game, 59-47. That was as close as the Lady Bears would get the rest of the night.

McWilliams-Franklin hit a couple baskets, followed by a pair of Taurasi free throws and with 7:43 remaining the game was blown wide open, 65-47. Baylor managed another basket, but Augustus, Leslie and Taurasi all put up points in a 7-0 run that expanded the USA's insurmountable lead to 72-49. The gap ballooned to 26 points twice before the final buzzer.

The National Team outrebounded Baylor 56-38 and its second half performance produced 14 of the squad's 21 assists and held the turnovers to eight for a total of 20 on the night.

Baylor was paced by Jessica Morrow's 17 points, while Angela Tisdale finished with 14. Both players had 12 by halftime. Also, Rachel Allison was the game's high rebounder with 12 to go with her six points.

### USA 83, Tennessee 72

November 4, 2007 • Knoxville, Tenn.

Diana Taurasi scored 28 points and Lisa Leslie had a double-double of 18 points and 12 rebounds as the USA earned an 83-72 victory over No. 1 Tennessee on Nov. 4. Also scoring in double digits were Seimone Augustus with 12 points and Sue Bird with 11.

The USA knew the game against the top-ranked Lady Vols was not going to be easy. Especially considering the opponents' top player is not only among the nation's elite college players, Candace Parker is one of the best players on the 2007-08 USA Basketball Women's National Team roster.

Tennessee kept the first 10 minutes close and at 9:32 owned an 18-15 edge. Receiving five points from Leslie, the USA posted nine straight to go ahead 24-18 at 7:28. The U.S. never again trailed and at halftime held a 9-point, 38-29, lead.

In the second half Parker, who scored four points on 1-of-6 shooting from the field in the first stanza, came alive with 18 second-half points.

With the USA up 73-61, Parker scored a layup 5:29 to go and 23 seconds later was sent to the line where she collected her final point of the game, closing the gap to single digits at 73-64. Shannon Bobbitt followed that with a pair of threes, giving new life to the Lady Vols, who were looking at a margin of just three points, 73-70, with 3:48 to go.

However, Bobbitt's threes were Tennessee's final field goals of the game. The USA's went on a 10-1 run to close the door on the game.

Leslie not only produced a double-double, she dished out five assists, had six blocked shots and six steals. Taurasi came close to a double-double after securing nine boards, all on the defensive end.

Parker's 22 points led the Lady Vols, while Angie Bjorklund, playing in her first collegiate game, added 13 points and shot 3-of-4 from afar.

### USA 90, Connecticut 74

November 2, 2007 • Storrs, Conn.

Lisa Leslie put up 19 points, grabbed six rebounds, passed out three assists and had three blocks in aiding the USA to a 90-74 victory over No. 2 Connecticut on Nov. 2. With the victory, Sue Bird, Swin Cash and Diana Taurasi continued their winning ways in Gampel Pavilion, home to their storied collegiate careers, and combined for 26 points and nine assists.

Also scoring in double digits for the U.S. squad were Kara Lawson with 15 points, Seimone Augustus and Taurasi posted 14 each and Katie Feenstra came up with 10 points.

The Huskies matched up with the USA squad and kept the game close with two tied scores and four lead changes to start the contest, but

the U.S. finally took the lead for good on a Kara Braxton layup at 9:36. From there, the USA steadily increased its lead and took a 13-point, 45-32, lead into the locker room.

The Americans expanded the lead to 17 on a pair of Leslie free throws as the game looked to be on its way to a blowout with 17:25 still to play. But UConn had other ideas. Capitalizing on the USA's 4-of-14 shooting and five turnovers, the Huskies fought their way back into contention, 64-60, by the 8:09 mark.

However, with the game at a seven-point margin a minute earlier, Donovan inserted four of her starters back in and the lineup of Bird, Lawson, Leslie, Taj McWilliams-Franklin and Taurasi got the USA back to a double-digit lead, 71-60, with 5:47 to play.

The USA continued to hold off UConn, going up by as many as 18 points, 83-65, with 3:33 to play, to take the victory.

### USA 90, Maryland 73

October 31, 2007 • College Park, Md.

Kara Lawson scored 17 points and dished out a game-high eight assists as the USA National Team surged past No. 4 Maryland to take a 90-73 victory on Halloween in College Park, Md. The USA also received 16 points from Seimone Augustus, Diana Taurasi tossed in 15 points, while Lisa Leslie grabbed a game-best 10 boards and contributed eight points.

Maryland held its own through the first half, behind 14 points from 2007 USA U21 World Championship Team gold medalist Laura Harper, as the U.S. owned a 40-38 edge at the midway break.

Holding a three-point, 42-39, lead early in the second half, the United States got into its groove. Scoring nine straight points to kick-off a 22-6 run, with 11 minutes remaining in the contest the U.S. was out in front 64-45 and never looked back.

Harper finished the game with 20 points and eight boards, while Kristi Toliver scored 18 points and 2007 USA Pan American Games gold medalist Marissa Coleman notched nine points, five rebounds, five assists and two blocked shots for the Terps.

### FIBA Americas Champ. Recaps

#### USA 101, Cuba 71 / Gold Medal Game

September 30, 2007 • Valdivia, Chile

A double-double of 15 points and 12 rebounds from Diana Taurasi highlighted five U.S. scorers in double digits as the USA completed its mission of qualifying for the 2008 Beijing Olympics by crushing Cuba 101-71.

Also scoring in double digits in helping the U.S. capture the 2007 FIBA Americas Championship gold medal were Tina Thompson with a game-high 18 points, Katie Smith also scored 15, Kara Lawson checked in to add 14 and Candace Parker tallied 12 points.

The USA women went up 16-0 before the game was even four minutes old. Their stifling defense during that time forced Cuba into 10 missed field goals before Oyanaisis Gelis Gonzalez put her squad on the board at 5:56.

The USA's lead was up to 25-5 by the 2:10 mark. But Cuba reeled off seven consecutive points and by the first quarter break the USA's 20-point lead was down to 29-13.

Cuba looked outside to its 3-point shooters, who helped cut the gap to 31-19 early in the second quarter. However, the North Americans simply had too much in their arsenal, hitting shots from inside and outside, mid-range jumpers and layups, even a couple of free throws. By halftime eight different players had contributed to the 49-30 advantage, including Thompson and Smith with 11 and 10 points, respectively.

Cuba attempted to keep pace with the USA in the third quarter, however, the U.S. was simply too deep and talented.

Cuba kept the game within 20 points through the second half's first four minutes (63-43), but the USA utilized a 15-1 run to close the period firmly in command, 78-44, and closed out the game with the gold medal

and a ticket to Beijing.

In addition to the scoring contributions from Lawson, Parker, Smith, Taurasi and Thompson, the USA was aided by four assists apiece from Cappie Pondexter, Smith and Taurasi.

### USA 104, Argentina 53

September 29, 2007 • Valdivia, Chile

Rebekkah Brunson came off the bench to score a team-high 20 points as the USA catapulted itself into the FIBA Americas Championship gold medal game with a dominating 104-53 performance over Argentina. Also aiding in the scoring barrage were Candace Parker with 17 points, Seimone Augustus had 15 and Katie Smith notched 11 points.

Parker scored the game's first six points helping spark a 13-2 U.S. opening run, setting the tone early. At the end of the first quarter the USA was out in front 28-9. With the starting five out for the second quarter the bench continued to hammer away in a 21-1 second quarter sprint that put the game well beyond reach, 49-10, with 2:48 still to go before the midway break. By halftime the North Americans owned an insurmountable 56-15 advantage.

The USA went up 78-31 at the end of three and sailed through the fourth quarter for the 104-53 win.

### USA 85, Canada 37

September 28, 2007 • Valdivia, Chile

The USA put away Canada early and went on to capture an 85-37 victory in its third and final preliminary round game. Tina Thompson's 14 points led the squad, while DeLisha Milton-Jones and Candace Parker each chipped in 12 points as the USA led from start to finish.

Behind six points apiece from Parker and Thompson, the USA stunned Canada with a 14-2 opening run. Canada came to life after that and put together its best five minutes of the day. The USA's neighbors to the north fought their way back into the game by outscoring the U.S. 11-3 and by the end of the first stanza the red, white and blue's lead was cut to 17-13.

Receiving all of its points from the bench the U.S. went ahead 28-15 in just over four minutes of play in the second quarter. Canada had no answer as wave after wave of substitutions by the defending Olympic champs never let up the defensive intensity and by halftime the game was well in hand 38-19.

Outscoring Canada 21-6 in the second quarter and 19-9 in the third, the U.S. rolled through the fourth quarter 23-9 for its third win in as many days.

### USA 115, Jamaica 47

September 27, 2007 • Valdivia, Chile

The USA ran out to an 11-0 run against Jamaica to open its second game at the FIBA Americas Championship and never looked back en route to an eventual 115-47 win.

The dominating performance saw each team member score at least four points, including Seimone Augustus' game-high 19 points on a perfect shooting afternoon (8-8 FGs, 3-3 FTs). Additionally Tina Thompson followed with 18, Diana Taurasi had 12 and Sue Bird and Kara Lawson chipped in 11 apiece.

The USA's points were well distributed from the start as eight different players scored during the first period that ended with the defending Olympic champs on top 22-11. The USA's show of force never let up as the red, white and blue continued to overpower its opponents for a 20-point, 48-28, halftime lead.

Putting on an offensive clinic in the third quarter, one that included a Parker dunk attempt, the North Americans outscored Jamaica 35-13. The U.S. also showed off its defensive prowess and allowed the islanders just three field goals during that span, closing out the stanza up 83-41.

Utilizing bench players in the fourth quarter, the USA's defensive intensity didn't drop a bit as the squad outscored Jamaica 32-6 for the eventual victory.



# 2007 USA Basketball Women's National Team

## USA vs. Texas A&M • 11/11/07 • College Station, Texas

Cappie Pondexter dished out nine of the USA's 32 assists on a total of 44 field goals and came close to a double-double with eight points. Also distributing the ball well were Lawson and Katie Smith, who passed off for seven and six assists, respectively.

### USA 85, Cuba 79

September 26, 2007 • Valdivia, Chile

In a back and forth battle for most of the evening, the USA needed all four quarters to finish with an 85-79 victory over Cuba to open play at the 2007 FIBA Americas Championship.

Candace Parker scored a team-high 21 points, Diana Taurasi contributed 16, while Katie Smith and Tina Thompson each notched 13 points. Sue Bird had a hand in many of those points after dishing out nine assists.

Facing an athletic and well organized Cuban squad, with a little over four minutes to play the USA found itself deadlocked at 71-71.

Eyeing a zone defense Bird drove to the hoop, bringing defenders with her and kicked it out to Smith who nailed a 3-pointer from the left side. Following a Cuban turnover Bird and Smith combined for a nearly identical play -- this time Smith was beyond the arc in the middle of the court -- and with 3:41 remaining the USA was up 77-71.

Cuba National Team veteran Yayma Boulet was able to wedge a bucket into what became an 11-2 run that saw Parker cap it with a leaning layup at 2:06, giving the United States an 82-73 advantage.

The red, white and blue kept up its intensity and closed out the night with the win.

## USA Exhibition Game Recaps

### USA 70, Australia 66

September 19, 2007 • Uncasville, Connecticut

Behind a game-high 23 points from Candace Parker, the USA National Team upped its exhibition record on the year to 6-0 and capped its two-game exhibition series with a second victory against Australia, 70-66. The USA also received 12 points from Seimone Augustus.

Australia came out fighting and the U.S. was sluggish and flat. However, the USA managed a 24-23 edge at the end of the first quarter. Australia opened the second with a 10-2 run and at 5:23 the USA was in the hole 33-26. The U.S. was given its requested time out following the second Grima bucket and Donovan regrouped her troops. Returning to the court with more focus, the Americans erased the deficit and evened the score at 33-all with 2:16 to go. By halftime Australia owned a 36-35 lead.

The second half remained a battle. Neither team was able to hold onto more than a five-point lead in the third quarter, which ended with the United States up by two points, 53-51.

Australia knotted the score twice early in the fourth quarter, but a pair of Kara Lawson free throws at 8:33 gave the U.S. the lead for good, 57-55. Rebekkah Brunson, who grabbed a game-high nine rebounds, got a steal on Australia's next possession and got the ball to Parker for the first of back-to-back Parker buckets that put the red, white and blue up 61-55 with 7:41 to play. Australia inched back to within two points three times and with 1:54 to play the U.S. was up 68-66.

After misses on both ends and an offensive foul committed by Brunson, she was fouled with 26.6 ticks remaining. Brunson sunk both for the game's final points. Australia managed to get off a 3-point attempt with under 10 seconds to play, but it was off the mark and Parker grabbed the rebound to seal the win.

### USA 96, Australia 64

September 16, 2007 • Trenton, New Jersey

Despite only having 10 players on the roster, three of whom still have at least one year of collegiate eligibility remaining, the USA earned a 96-64 victory over Australia at the Sovereign Bank Arena in Trenton, N.J.

Tina Thompson came off the bench to score a game-high 21 points,

while Candice Wiggins scored 18 points playing in her first game with the senior squad and Courtney Paris logged 12 points.

To be fair, Australia was also without some of its big guns, including 2007 WNBA MVP Lauren Jackson and Penny Taylor.

After a slow start that saw neither team get in a groove, the USA was up 8-6 after 6:35 of play. Candace Parker got a steal and a layup at 3:06, sparking an 8-0 run and by the end of the first quarter the USA was up 18-9.

Thompson, who didn't leave the bench in the first quarter, nailed a 3-pointer on her first touch of the game as the U.S. jumped out to a quick 25-9 lead 1:32 into the second period. Australia took advantage of a USA lapse in energy and outscored the Americans 7-2 to pull to within 11 points, 27-16 at 6:59, but that was as close as the score would be for the remainder of the day. By halftime the USA was up 39-25, at the end of three it was 65-42 and the U.S. continued to cruise to the win.

Kara Lawson was the leading rebounder with seven to go with six points and a team-best four assists, Sue Bird scored nine points and Parker finished with eight.

### USA 84, Pomezia Region All-Stars 41

April 17, 2007 • Pomezia, Italy

The USA easily dispatched the Pomezia Regional All-Stars 81-41 in its final 2007 Tour of Italy Contest. Pacing the high-octane offensive attack were Tamika Catchings and Jessica Davenport with 13 points apiece, while Taj McWilliams-Franklin and Courtney Paris also scored in double digits with 11 and 10 points, respectively.

The Pomezia All-Stars struck first with a bucket at 9:28, but their lead vanished as quick as it came. Catchings, who opened the USA's scoring with a three, nailed her second bucket at 7:41 to give the USA a lead it would never relinquish, 5-4. With the USA ahead 13-9 McWilliams-Franklin sparked a USA 10-0 run that opened up the game 23-9 and by the end of the first quarter the USA was up 23-15.

Holding their opponents to five points in the second quarter, the American women sailed into the locker room with a 17-point, 37-20 advantage and never looked back. Outscoring Pomezia 19-7 in the third quarter and 25-14 in the final stanza the U.S. punctuated its four-game 2007 Tour of Italy with the 81-41 victory.

In addition to Catchings, Davenport, McWilliams-Franklin and Paris, the USA was aided by nine points apiece from Swin Cash and Sylvia Fowles. Davenport and Fowles grabbed nine and eight boards, respectively, while Lindsey Harding dished out five assists.

### USA 82, Virtus Viterbo 42

April 16, 2007 • Viterbo, Italy

Utilizing a balanced scoring attack and receiving a pair of double-doubles from Tamika Catchings and Taj McWilliams-Franklin, the U.S. squad dominated professional club team Virtus Viterbo 82-42 at the Pala Male in Viterbo, Italy. Catchings paced all scorers and rebounders with 15 points and 12 rebounds, while McWilliams-Franklin contributed 11 points and 10 rebounds.

The U.S. scored first and never trailed. However, Viterbo kept it close through the first period that ended with the USA on top 15-12. Receiving points from four different players the Americans were ahead 23-15 less than three minutes into the second quarter. Swin Cash contributed six points and had an assist on a Katie Smith three in a 16-0 run that blew open the contest 39-15 with 4:01 to play before the end of the half. By the midway point in the game it was all USA, 47-21.

Cruising through the second half, which saw the U.S. open the fourth quarter on a 17-0 tear, the United States came away with their third win in as many games.

In addition to Catchings and McWilliams-Franklin's double-doubles, the USA's efforts were further aided by 11 points from Jessica Davenport.

### USA 72, Phard Napoli 49

April 16, 2007 • Napoli, Italy

USA vs. Texas A&M • 11/11/07 • College Station, Texas

Tamika Catchings posted a double-double of 14 points and 11 rebounds to lead the USA to a 72-49 victory against professional club team Phard Napoli at the Pala Barbuto in Napels. Much like its first game against the Italian National Team, the USA squad spent the first half in a tough battle but dominated in the second half for the win.

After struggling in a first half that saw the score see-saw, the USA trailed 30-28 with 6:27 before the break. Alana Beard knotted the game with a jumper at 6:09 and that spurred an 8-1 run that gave the Americans the lead for good, 36-31, at 2:34. By halftime the gap remained at five points, 38-33.

Katie Smith hit back-to-back threes to open the USA's second half scoring, however, the Napels squad would not go away and with 13:46 to play the USA held a 44-43 edge. That was as close as it would get. The red, white and blue outscored Napoli 9-2 over the remainder of the quarter and owned a 53-45 lead heading into the final stanza.

Utilizing a 14-0 run to open the second half, the 2007-08 USA Basketball Women's Senior National Team opened up its exhibition competition by running away with a 77-47 victory over the Italian National Team at the Pallazetto dello Sport in front of a packed house and an Italian nationally televised audience.

Leading the charge for the U.S. were Sylvia Fowles and Taj McWilliams-Franklin, who notched 15 and 14 points, respectively.

By the end of the third quarter the USA was up 59-35 and expanded the lead to 77-47 through the fourth.

In addition to Fowles' 15 points, she grabbed a game-high eight rebounds, while McWilliams-Franklin shot a perfect 5-of-5 from the field and 4-of-4 from the line and also collected seven rebounds on the night.

- *2007 FIBA America Zone Olympic Qualifying Tournament:* The United States defeated Cuba 101-71 to capture the FIBA Americas Championship and qualify for the 2008 Olympics.
- *2007 FIBA Asia Zone Olympic Qualifying Tournament:* South Korea defeated China 79-73 to win the FIBA Asia Championship For Women and qualify for the 2008 Olympics.
- *2007 FIBA Europe Zone Olympic Qualifying Tournament:* Russia defeated Spain 74-68 to win the FIBA Europe Championship For Women and qualify for the 2008 Olympics.
- *2007 FIBA Oceania Zone Olympic Qualifying Tournament:* Australia defeated New Zealand 87-46 in the Oceania Championship For Women gold medal game. But because Australia qualified for the 2008 Olympics as the 2006 FIBA World Champions, New Zealand earned Oceania's 2008 Olympic qualifying berth.

**2008 FIBA WORLD OLYMPIC QUALIFYING TOURNAMENT**

The final five qualifying berths for the 2008 Olympics women's basketball competition will be determined through the 2008 FIBA Olympic Qualifying Tournament For Women (June 9-15, site TBD). A total of 12 teams will compete in the 2008 FIBA Olympic Qualifying Tournament and those 12 teams will be based on finishes in each of FIBA's five zone qualifying tournaments. The FIBA Africa Zone placed two teams (runner-up Senegal and third place finisher Angola); the FIBA Americas Zone advanced three teams (second place Cuba, third place Brazil and fourth place Argentina); the FIBA Asia Zone placed two teams (runner-up Japan and third place finisher Chinese Taipei); the FIBA Europe Zone will advance four teams (second place, third place, fourth place and fifth place); and FIBA Oceania Zone advanced one team (third place finisher Fiji).

The 12 teams will be divided in four groups of three teams each and will play a single round robin. The two best placed teams from each group will qualify for the quarterfinals, and the four winners of their quarterfinals games will qualify for the Olympic Games and return home. The four quarterfinals losers will play in the semifinals and the two winners will then play for the remaining Olympic qualifying berth.
