## RECORD STREAK

The United States women, who have not lost a game in the Olympics since falling to the Unified Team in the 1992 Games, are riding a 31-0 winning streak that dates to the '92 bronze medal game and includes golds in 1996, 2000 and 2004, as well as its first six victories here in Beijing. Overall in Olympic play the U.S. women are 48-3 since women's basketball was added to the Olympic slate in 1976. (see pages 54-78 of the USA guide for the complete U.S. Olympic history)

## RUSSIA IN THE 2008 OLYMPICS

### FIBA Women's World Ranking: No. 3

Russia emerged from Group A with the No. 2 seed after wins over Latvia (62-57), South Korea (77-72), Belarus (71-65) and Brazil (75-55) and a loss to Australia (75-55). Russia advanced to play the USA in the semifinals after topping Spain 84-65 in the medal round quarterfinals. In preliminary group play, Tatian Schchegoleva and Ilona Korstin led with 13 points apiece against Latvia and South Korea; Maria Stepanova tallied 13 points against Belarus, Schchegoleva scored 14 points against Brazil and Becky Hammon scored 20 points in the loss to Australia. Nineteen points from Schchegoleva helped lead Russia past Spain the quarters.

Russia is led by three players in double figures, including Hammon with 13.2 ppg., Schchegoleva with 11.8 ppg. and Korstin with 10.3 ppg. Russia is shooting 43.7 percent from the field, 44.7 percent from 3-point and 72.6 percent from the free throw line. Making 34-of-76 from 3-point Russia leads the tournament in 3-point field goal percentage (.447), and Svetlana Abrosimova's 6-of-8 performance from 3-point thus far leads the tournament individual's in 3-point field goal percentage.

## A LITTLE HISTORY

Russia, which earned its 2008 Olympic berth as the reigning FIBA Europe Champion, last met the USA in major international competition in the 2006 FIBA World Championship semifinals, when Russia won 75-68. Most recently on Aug. 4, the USA recorded a 93-58 win at the 2008 FIBA Diamond Ball Tournament in Haining, China (Note: the recap can be found on page 7, the USA-Russia box score is on page 10).

Overall, Russia and the USA have played twice in Olympic action, including a 66-62 U.S. win in the 2004 semifinals and an 88-77 U.S. victory in 2000. Additionally, the USA has an 0-1 tally against the Unified Team, losing 79-73 in the 1992 semifinal contest, and a 1-1 record against the former Soviet Union, winning 102-88 in 1988 and losing 112-77 in 1976.

## DEJA VU

The USA and Russia have met up in the semifinal contest of four of the last six 'international majors,' including the 1998 FIBA World Championship, 2002 FIBA World Championship 2004 Olympic Games and 2006 FIBA World Championship. The U.S. has come away with the victory three out of those four semis, falling to Russia at the '06 Worlds and dowing the Russians en route to golds at the '98 and '02 Worlds and '04 Olympics.

## THE SCOUTING REPORT: GAIL GOESTENKORS

**You've seen them through preliminary play and then in the quarterfinals. What do we know about Russia?**

Well they are playing their best basketball. They were 4-1 in pool play, but their average margin of victory was one point, so every game had been close. The game they lost to Australia was a difficult one for them. I've seen them play every game, and every game they get better and better. Last night, they started off with some difficulties. Spain was hitting all their shots, and it was really one of the first times I saw them dig deep, fight and come-back. I almost feel like they turned a corner last night. I saw a lot of emotion from them that I had not seen previously. It's going to be an unbelievable game with what's at stake and with what happened in the World Championship when they beat us. They are playing their best basketball, and I feel like we're starting to play our best basketball as well, so I know it will be an amazing environment.

## What makes them dangerous and how should we respond?

Well, they have so many weapons. They've got great size inside with Stepanova and Osipova, two huge players. Usually, we have the size advantage. They are actually bigger than we are, and that's something we're not used to. On the perimeter, they're guards are very big, very strong and they attack the basket. And then I think Becky Hammon adds a whole new dimension to their team in that she can shoot the three and she's a tremendous leader for them as well. She's really the one who spearheaded their comeback last night against Spain.

The way that we have to respond? We have to be strong, we have to be physical and we have to stay out of foul trouble because they do a great job getting to the free throw line. And then we have to dominate the boards and not let them have second chances.

## Are we ready for this game?

I think both teams are ready. It's going to be the best game of the tournament up to this point because both teams are playing their best basketball. Their fan support has been phenomenal. I saw Russian flags all over the arena yesterday, so they will be loud, and they will be boisterous. We hope to have fans from China supporting us as well. We've made good friends here.

## FAMILIAR FACES

Sue Bird and Diana Taurasi know the Russians very well. Not only do they play in the winters for Spartak Moscow alongside Svetlana Abrosimova, Marina Karpunina, Irina Osipova and Tatiana Shchegoleva; the two regularly face the remainder of the team in EuroLeague and/or Russian Super League play. Not to mention the fact that Abrosimova played at UConn with the dynamic duo.

## NEXT UP: ???

Should the U.S. advance past Russia to the gold medal game, the American women will face the winner of tonight's Australia vs. China contest.

## AUSTRALIA (6-0)

**FIBA Women's World Ranking:** No. 2

Australia earned its 2008 Olympic berth by capturing the gold medal at the 2006 FIBA World Championship in Brazil. It was Australia's first gold medal ever in Olympic or World Championship play, and they're gunning to dethrone the USA, three-time defending Olympic gold medalist, in Beijing.

The U.S. and Australia have met four times at the Olympics, most recently in the Athens Olympics gold medal game where the USA came away with the 74-63 victory and the top spot on the podium. In fact, the U.S. has never lost to Australia in Olympic or Worlds play and owns an overall 13-0 record against the Opals in those two events.

After not medaling at an Olympic or World Championship until Atlanta in 1996, Australia has been on the medal stand in each of the last five 'majors.' The Opals finished with a silver medal at the 2000 and 2004 Olympics, bronze at the '96 Games and bronze medals at the 1998 and 2002 World Championships before claiming the top spot in 2006.

Many of the Aussies are familiar faces to the U.S. squad. Not only have the two teams met several times recently, but many Australians have competed in the WNBA over the past few years, including Suzy Batkovic, Tully Bevilacqua, Kristi Harrower, Lauren Jackson, Erin Phillips, Laura Summerton and 2006 World Championship MVP Penny Taylor.

Sue Bird is not only a teammate of Jackson's with the Seattle Storm, she and Diana Taurasi compete alongside Jackson on Spartak Moscow in Russia during the winters. Cappie Pondexter and Diana Taurasi teamed up with Taylor to capture the 2007 WNBA crown with the Phoenix Mercury. Additionally, Tamika Catchigns and Bevilacqua are teammates on the Indiana Fever.

## Last Time Out: USA 71, Australia 67

These two teams met up on Aug. 5 in the 2008 FIBA Diamond Ball gold medal game and it was a typical fight to the finish seen every time the U.S. and Australia meet (*Note: the recap can be found on page 7, the box score on page 10*).

## CHINA (5-1)

**FIBA Women's World Ranking:** No. 10

As the host country China earned an automatic berth to the 2008 Olympic Games, its sixth women's Olympic basketball appearance.

In its first Olympic outing, China collected the '84 Games bronze medal and upped that to a silver in the 1992 Olympics. Competing also in 1988 and 1996, China finished sixth and ninth, respectively, in those Games. China also owns a silver and bronze medal in FIBA World Championship play.

The USA owns a 4-0 record against China in the Olympics and the last time the two met at the Olympics was in 2004 when

the U.S. ran away with a 100-62 victory. In 2006 the USA, which holds a 4-0 slate against the Asian nation at the Worlds, drubbed China 119-72 at the 2006 FIBA World Championship.

Following their ninth place finish in Athens, China looked to veteran international coach Tom Maher, who piloted Australia to the Olympic silver medal in Sydney and catapulted New Zealand to the quarterfinals in Athens. Maher, after finishing a disappointing 12th place at the '06 Worlds, has been working hard at bettering his Chinese club for this summer. The team competed in the 2007 FIBA World League Tournament, went up against some of the top collegiate teams in the U.S. last fall and in April earned the gold medal at the Olympic test event.

### Last Time Out: USA 108, China 63

These two teams met up on Aug. 11 in Olympic preliminary play and the U.S. took China to task 108-63.



### SURPRISE MEETING

Serendipity was hanging out in the BNU gym on Aug. 20. ### GIVING BRACELETS

The entire USA team was treated to a night out at the Johnson & Johnson Olympic Games Pavilion and the company presented each athlete with twin Chinese-themed bracelets—one to wear and one to share. Through the simple act of giving away the companion bracelet, every Olympian can say “thank you” to someone special who supported her journey to the Beijing 2008 Olympic Games. So who did they give the bracelets to? Many are undecided. However, Sylvia Fowles, Katie Smith and Tina Thompson rang in with their thoughts.

"I gave the bracelet to my mom. It was a tie between her and my college coach Bob Starkey. They were neck in neck because they have both been big inspirations for me. But in the end, I ended up giving it to my mom."

### TALE OF THE TAPE

After six games, the USA lists at the top of numerous statistical categories, including scoring offense (99.2 ppg.), scoring defense (56.0 ppg.), scoring margin (+43.2 ppg.), field goal percentage (.568), defensive field goal percentage (.355), rebounding defense (28.3), assists (19.67 apg.), turnover margin (+10.33) and assist/turnover ratio (1.71).

Because the U.S. team is so deep, there normally aren't many leaders in the individual rankings for a number of stats. However, through six games **Sylvia Fowles** ranks No. 8 among all scorers (14.3 ppg.) and is No. 3 in rebounds (8.7 rpg.), with **Lisa Leslie** No. 8 in rebounds (7.7 rpg.). The USA has seven of the top 10 for field goal percentage, including No. 1 **Tamika Catchings** (.818), No. 2 Fowles (.673), No. 3 **Cappie Pondexter** (.667), No. 4 **Candace Parker** (.595), No. 6 Leslie (.580), No. 9 **Tina Thompson** (.534) and No. 10 **Seimone Augustus** (.511). Kara Lawson ranks No. 3 in assists (3.67 apg.) with Pondexter at No. 9 (2.5 apg.); Lawson is No. 2 in 3-point field goal percentage (.583); Sue Bird and Catchings are tied at No. 8 in steals (1.83 spg.); Leslie (1.33 bpg.) and Fowles (0.83 bpg.) are No. 4 and No. 8, respectively, for blocked shots; while Lawson tops the charts in assist to turnover ratio (4.40).

### GREAT SCOTT!

Members of the USA women's team spent the morning of Aug. 16 to see the Great Wall of China. Several have been in the past, including Tamika Catchings and Kara Lawson as members of USA junior national teams, but not with their families and friends. Holiday card photo, anyone?

### THE RECORD BOOK

The U.S. Olympic record book is in the process of being rewritten. **Lisa Leslie** against Mali eclipsed the former field goal percentage record with a perfect 7-of-7 shooting. She overtook 2008 teammate **Katie Smith**, who shot 6-of-6 from the field in 2000 against Cuba; and **Nikki McCray**, who shot 6-of-6 in 1996 against South Korea. Additionally, Leslie tied five U.S. athletes for single-game blocked shots with three against Mali.

The U.S. also held Mali to the lowest opponent scoring total in history. Previously the record was held by New Zealand's 2000 squad, which was eclipsed by the USA that year 93-42.

In addition to game records, Leslie continues to up her overall USA individual career records in the Olympic Games. Entering the Beijing tournament she was the USA's all-time leading scorer with 407 points, rebounder with 185 caroms and shot blocker with 25 swats in 1996, 2000 and 2004.

**Tamika Catchings** is on pace to set the all-time U.S. Olympic single competition field goal percentage, she's currently shooting 81.8 percent and the record of 78.6 is owned by **Carol Menken-Schaudt**, set in 1984. Catchings could also take the 3-point percentage record of 71.4 away from **Suzie McConnell**, set in 1992. She's currently hitting 83.3 percent from behind the arc.

### CAPTAIN, MY CAPTAIN

The two most senior members of the USA team have been selected as the 2008 U.S. Olympic Team captains. Four-time Olympian **Lisa Leslie** and three-time Olympian **Katie Smith**, who own five Olympic golds in all, are this year's team captains.

### TOP FAN

**President George W. Bush** took in three quarters of the USA's opening contest against the Czech Republic and seemed to enjoy the dominating show put on by the U.S. squad.

"He was rooting hard and when we got down early he was really pulling for the team to come back as they did," said USA Basketball President **Val Ackerman**, who sat next to the President during the game. "It was a good experience and very heartening to see him supporting us so fervently."

### BIGGER CHEERING SECTION

The USA's fan base also includes the USA Basketball men's squad, all of whom were on hand to see the women capture their first win. Both teams are very supportive of each other and are pulling for 'double gold' here in China.

"Oh yeah the guys have been great, we had a good time last night at opening ceremonies and they're just really committed to coming out and supporting us as we are of supporting them and I think that's just cool in itself," said **Lisa Leslie**.

### BRIGHT FUTURE

The future of the USA Basketball Women's National Team looks pretty bright. In addition to the younger members of this year's U.S. Olympic Team, there are some shining stars on the horizon who are looking to advance from the junior level to the senior level.

Capping four years of dominance in their age group competitions, the 2007 USA U21 National Team took gold after

going through host Russia in the semifinals 86-61 and rival Australia 96-73 in the gold medal game. This age group (players born on or after Jan. 1, 1986) closed out its FIBA age-based competition with four gold medals and an undefeated mark of 26-0 in official FIBA and FIBA Americas tournaments after capturing the 2004 FIBA Americas U18 Championship (5-0), 2005 FIBA U19 World Championship (8-0) and 2006 FIBA Americas U20 Championship (5-0). The team in '07 was paced by Maryland's **Crystal Langhorne** (15.6 ppg., 8.9 rpg.), Stanford's **Candice Wiggins** (13.1 ppg.) and Oklahoma's **Courtney Paris** (10.9 ppg.). Both Paris and Wiggins were also members of the 2007-08 USA Basketball Women's National Team.

At the 2007 FIBA U19 World Championship the USA U19 National Team cruised through its competition for a perfect 9-0 slate and the gold medal. Owing a +34.6 points per game margin of victory, the U.S. was paced on the offensive end by UConn standout **Maya Moore** (16.3 ppg.) and Ohio State's **Jantel Lavender** (16.0 ppg.).

Members of the '07 U21 squad will likely be in the mix for the 2010 USA Basketball World Championship Team, while USA Basketball will look at '07 U19 team members for future events.

## USA COLLEGE TOUR NO. 3

Last year marked the third USA Basketball Women's National Team College Tour. The historic 1995-96 USA National Team went 20-0 against top NCAA programs, the 1999-2000 USA National Team compiled a mark of 11-1 during its pre-Olympic training and the 2007-08 USA National Team posted an 8-0 mark over collegians from coast to coast.

## TRAINING DAYS

The USA women will train on Aug. 22 at Beijing Normal University or another local practice site TBD. Media will be allowed viewing access for the final half hour of each session with interviews to take place following the practice. ## MARK YOUR CALENDARS

The next FIBA World Championship, which is held every four years, will be held in 2010 in the Czech Republic. In international basketball the World Championship gold medal is just as coveted a prize as the Olympic gold.

## QUICK CHEMISTRY

Prior to the USA's opening game against the Czech Republic the team had nine days of practice together as a full 12-member unit. Three were at Stanford July 27-29, the squad had one practice and three exhibition contests in Haining, China, Aug. 2-5 and a pair of practices in Beijing Aug. 7-8. Despite the lack of training time together, the USA coaching staff has been putting in their offensive and defensive system over the past few years. Eight played together under Anne Donovan and her coaching staff of Gail Goestenkors, Dawn Staley and Mike Thibault at the 2006 FIBA World Championship; nine aided the U.S. to its Olympic berth at the 2007 FIBA Americas Championship; while a variety of mixes were seen on the court during the the different training camps. The USA Select Team, for instance, featured a heavy dose of perimeter play, while the USA National Team that competed in the 2008 Good Luck Beijing Tournament was heavier in the post.

## ELITE GROUP

With the 2007 WNBA title under her belt, **Diana Taurasi** entered an elite group that now counts seven U.S. women among its members. It's called the Tri-Fecta Club and includes athletes who have captured an Olympic gold medal, a WNBA title and an NCAA championship. Other members of the club are: **Sue Bird**, Swin Cash, Cynthia Cooper, Ruth Riley, Sheryl Swoopes and Kara Wolters. If Taurasi returns in 2010 and the U.S. wins gold at the FIBA World Championship she'll join an even more exclusive club of women who have all four honors (Bird, Cooper, Swoopes, Wolters).

## 2008 Olympic Recaps

### USA 104, South Korea

August 17, 2008 • Beijing, China

Led by 26 points and 14 rebounds from Sylvia Fowles, the USA used its size and a monster 26-9 second quarter to wear down South Korea early and roll to a 104-60 quarterfinals win and a berth into the Olympic semifinals on Aug. 17.

Everybody scored for the USA in the win over South Korea, including 12 points from Diana Taurasi, 11 points from both Kara Lawson and Cappie Pondexter, and 10 points from Lisa Leslie.

Down 4-2 early, Leslie converted on a Taurasi assist to kick-off a 6-0 run that brought the score to 8-4 in the USA's favor when South Korea called its first timeout with 6:23 on the clock. The ensuing 3:37 featured six lead changes, and at the end of the first quarter the American women led 25-21.

The USA opened the second period with a 3-pointer from Kara Lawson that brought the score to 28-21 just 33 seconds into the stanza, and the game never again was close.

The U.S. defense limited South Korea to just three made baskets and a total of nine points in the second period as the U.S. advantage ballooned to 21 points, 51-30, at halftime.

Fowles tallied nine of her 26 points in the third quarter as the U.S. again outscored Korea 26-9.

The USA outscored South Korea 27-21 in the fourth period to bring the final score to its 104-60 tally.

### USA 96, New Zealand 60

August 17, 2008 • Beijing, China

In its final preliminary round game, the USA needed 10 minutes to warm up before securing the blowout. Outscoring their opponent 27-6 in the second quarter, the USA women pounded New Zealand 96-60

on Aug. 17.

Tina Thompson led four U.S. scorers in double figures with 15 points; Katie Smith added 13 points; Seimone Augustus tallied 12 points and Tamika Catchings contributed 11 points.

While the USA shot 44.4 percent from the field in the first period, well below the 57.3 percent it would shoot for the game, New Zealand made 7-of-15 from the field and sank two 3-pointers in the first quarter to keep the Americans within five points, 23-18, at the end of one.

The U.S. expanded its lead to 31-22 when New Zealand called a timeout with 7:10 on the clock. Coming out of the break, the USA forced a shot clock violation, and from there the red, white and blue raced to 21 unanswered points. Thompson tallied 10 points during the spurt, and the USA took a 50-22 lead when DeLisha Milton-Jones sank a bucket with 19.4 seconds remaining before the halftime intermission. New Zealand hit a baseline jumper to beat the buzzer, and the score was 50-24 as the USA headed to the locker room.

Led by eight points from Smith, the USA outscored New Zealand 25-18 in the third quarter to improve its lead to 75-42.

The U.S. continued to control the game through the final buzzer, taking its biggest lead, 29 points, at 2:40 with a score of 92-53.

### USA 93, Spain 55

August 15, 2008 • Beijing, China

Watching a 19-4 first quarter lead dwindle to just five points at halftime, the defense of the USA buckled down in the second half while its offense heated up to help the red, white and blue roll to a 93-55 win over Spain on Aug. 15.

Tina Thompson led five U.S. players in double figures with 17 points and seven rebounds; Lisa Leslie recorded a 14-point, 11-rebound double-double; Candace Parker tallied 13 points and five rebounds; Diana Taurasi contributed 12 points and six rebounds; and Sylvia Fowles scored 10 points.

The USA held a commanding 19-4 lead with 2:00 left in the quarter, forcing Spain to call its first timeout. The break served its purpose, however, as Spain sank four 3-pointers in the period's final 1:38 to help cut the U.S. lead to 22-17 after one.

Spain put the second period's first two points on the board to bring the score to 22-19. But a Leslie bucket at 9:27 again sparked the USA, which raced to six consecutive points, and with 7:58 on the clock improved the U.S. lead to 28-19. Spain twice cut the advantage to three points in the second period, but the USA responded each time and the scoreboard read 39-34 at the half.

In the game's final 20 minutes, the USA allowed Spain just six made field goals in 21 attempts, while the American offense outscored Spain 54-21. The USA also forced 13 of Spain's 22 turnovers in the second half and collected seven of its 11 steals.

### USA 97, Mali 41

August 13, 2008 • Beijing, China

The U.S. needed just 10 minutes to build a double-digit lead and went on to secure a 97-41 win against overmatched Mali on Aug. 13.

The USA offense was clicking on all cylinders, as the red, white and blue shot 62.0 percent overall (41-66 FGs), 43.0 percent from behind the arc (6-14 3pt FGs) and tallied 29 assists, including seven from Kara Lawson. Defensively, the Americans forced 29 turnovers and held Mali to just 25.0 percent shooting (14-56 FGs).

Lisa Leslie, who scored a game-high 16 points, set a U.S. Olympic single-game record on 7-of-7 shooting from the field and also equaled the U.S. mark for blocked shots in a game with three.

Seimone Augustus added 12 points and three assists to the U.S. effort; and Candace Parker, Cappie Pondexter and Tina Thompson each scored 10 points.

The USA jumped to a 7-0 lead before Mali grabbed an 8-7 lead, prompting a U.S. timeout at 5:34.

Following the break, the U.S. responded with a 17-4 run and the game's outcome was never again in doubt. Leslie scored six of her eventual 16 points in the first 10 minutes to help the USA take 24-12

lead after the first period. By halftime the USA was up 51-28 and with the final 10 minutes to play the USA owned a dominating 76-33 edge.

### USA 108, China 63

August 11, 2008 • Beijing, China

Led by 27 points from Tina Thompson, the U.S. jumped on host China early and rode a 23-0 first quarter run to an easy 108-63 win on Aug. 11.

In addition to Thompson, whose 27 points tied Cynthia Cooper and Katrina McClain for the fourth-best single-game scoring output in the women's U.S. Olympic record book, the USA was helped by 18 points and eight rebounds from Sylvia Fowles, 12 points from Candace Parker and a 10-point, 10-rebound double-double from three-time Olympic gold medalist Lisa Leslie.

China opened the game with a 6-2 lead at 7:50 in the first period. Diana Taurasi countered with an easy basket at the rim, followed by a Sue Bird steal and fast-break layup to tie the score 6-6 at 7:22. The squads traded baskets in the next two minutes, and a 3-pointer from China brought the score to 11-10 in the host's favor at 5:48.

That was the last time China would score in the period or have a chance at a win, however, as the U.S. defense buckled down and its offense raced to a 23-0 run to close the period up 33-11. Thompson scored 13 of her 21 first half points during the stretch.

As the U.S. spread its 28 second-quarter points across eight players, its lead ballooned to 34 points, 61-27, at halftime.

The USA increased its advantage by just one point in the third period to take a 81-46 lead. Relying on its reserves, the USA went on to outscore China 27-17 in the final 10 minutes to bring the score to the final 108-63 tally.

### USA 97, Czech Republic 57

August 9, 2008 • Beijing, China

The U.S. overcame a slow start and an early 11-point deficit against the Czech Republic to claim a 40-point, 97-57 victory in its opening game of the 2008 Olympics on Aug. 9

Led by 17 points from Diana Taurasi, all 12 U.S. players scored in the game. In their Olympic debuts, Sylvia Fowles recorded a double-double of 16 points and 14 rebounds and Cappie Pondexter tallied 12 points; while three-time Olympic gold medalist Lisa Leslie collected 10 rebounds.

After missing its first four shot attempts, the USA quickly fell behind 8-0 when a Taurasi jumper at 6:39 brought the score to 8-2. The basket didn't slow the Czech Republic, however, which had built a 17-10 lead with 3:15 remaining in the period.

It was a Leslie jumper at 2:53 that turned the tide in the USA's favor, kicking off a 12-0 scoring run that included points from five U.S. players and the game was tied at 17-all. The USA took its first lead, 19-17, when Tamika Catchings converted on an offensive rebound with 1:26 on the clock. Holding a 22-17 advantage at the first break, the USA never again trailed.

## 2008 FIBA Diamond Ball Recaps

### USA 71, Australia 67

August 5, 2008 • Haining, China

Paced by 14 points and 10 rebounds from Lisa Leslie, the USA survived a classic battle against Australia for a 71-67 victory and the 2008 FIBA Diamond Ball gold medal on Aug. 5.

Sue Bird, who scored 11 points; Diana Taurasi, who had six points and three assists; and Candace Parker, who notched 12 points and eight boards; were named to the 2008 FIBA Diamond Ball All-Tournament Team. They were joined by China's Sui Feifei and tournament MVP Lauren Jackson of Australia.

As is expected, the game was a battle from the tip. The first quarter featured five lead changes and four knotted scores as the U.S. edged Australia 16-15. Australia retook the lead with the second quarter's first basket to go up 17-16. Kara Lawson hit a three to kick-off a 9-0 run,

and the U.S. was up 25-17, never again falling behind. By the 1:47 mark the USA's lead grew to its largest of the night, 35-23.

However, with 34.9 seconds before the break, Penny Taylor was sent to the line. After making both, Australia got two quick buckets and by halftime the USA's lead was clipped to 35-29.

Foul trouble again plagued the United States, which had five players whistled for two fouls apiece in the first half. By the 3:11 mark in the third Seimone Augustus, Sylvia Fowles, Leslie and Katie Smith had all picked up their third fouls. Australia took advantage of the USA's sitting stars and knotted the score twice, the second at 50-all at 1:24.

The refuse-to-lose attitude spurred a 6-0 run in the final minute of the quarter to bring the score to 56-50 with 10 minutes to play.

Australia continued to claw back, but the U.S. would not back down. With the Americans up 67-65, Bird came up with a loose ball, passed it up the court to Taurasi, who hit Leslie with a no-look pass to up the ante to 69-65 at 2:10. Taylor scored on the other end, but Tina Thompson had an answer for the game's final points at 1:09.

From there, the USA's relentless defense forced a shot-clock violation but the Americans coughed the ball up shortly after. With 10 seconds to go Thompson stripped Kristi Harrower of the ball, and the USA dribbled out the clock to collect the gold medal.

## USA 93, Russia 58

August 4, 2008 • Haining, China

Diana Taurasi scored 21 points, Sylvia Fowles added 15 and Candace Parker contributed 12 as the USA defeated rival Russia 93-58 on Aug. 4.

The U.S. never trailed in the game, running out to a 9-2 lead in the opening minutes, and by the end of the first quarter the red, white and blue was up 17-10.

Tina Thompson converted on an offensive board at 7:04, sparking a 19-2 run that blew the game wide open, 43-17, with 31 seconds to play before the break and by halftime the U.S. was up 43-19.

The Americans pulled further away and made it a 30-point game, 53-23, with 6:45 to go. Russia hit five straight threes and capped their third quarter scoring with a field goal that narrowed the game to 59-40 at 2:34. But that was as close as the Russians would get and at the end of three it was the USA 67-40.

From there the Americans cruised through the fourth quarter, outscoring the Russian women 26-18 to cap the night.

## USA vs. Latvia

August 3, 2008 • Haining, China

Sylvia Fowles scored 13 points, including eight in the final 4:07, to lead five players in double digits as the USA defeated Latvia 84-74 on Aug 3. Also aiding in the balanced scoring column were Tina Thompson with 12 points, Seimone Augustus and Sue Bird pitched in 11 points apiece and Lisa Leslie added 10.

The USA found itself on the trailing end of a 12-7 score 3:24 into the contest. However, the USA closed the first quarter on a 24-6 run to earn a 31-18 lead at the first break and never again trailed.

The U.S. took its biggest lead of the game, 42-26, with 4:34 to go before halftime. But Latvia cut the margin to 47-38 at the midway break.

Relying on its outside game and a perfect 4-of-4 from the line, the Europeans managed to get to within three, 60-57, with less than a minute to play in the third. But the USA closed the third period up 65-57.

Four points was as close as the game would get in the final stanza, 71-67, with 7:19 to play. Bird countered with a three and Fowles took a Smith feed inside to up the ante to 76-67. Following a Latvia three, Fowles scored the USA's next two buckets and the USA's lead was back up to double digits, 80-70 with 2:36 left in the contest. Latvia never recovered, and the red, white and blue came away with the victory.
