NATIONAL & INTERNATIONAL EVENTS LISTED

DF

- Held at the U.S. Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs, Colo., the inaugural USA Basketball Youth Development Festival in 2002 featured four teams of high school athletes from the North, South, East and West regions of the United States in a round-robin tournament. The North claimed the first gold medal at the event, in 2003 the USA East Team took the gold and in 2004 the USA West, which had finished no higher than third in '02 and '03, was the golden squad. In 2005, the most recent Festival, the U.S. fielded three teams (Red, White and Blue) with a team from Canada making up the fourth squad. The USA Blue went 5-0 for the gold.

ISI

- The 15 USA U19 World Championship Team finalists took on U19 national teams from Australia, China and Russia at the 2005 International Sports Invitational in San Diego, Calif. Coached by Duke's **Gail Goestenkers** and assisted by Indiana's **Felisha Legette-Jack** (then at Hofstra) and Ole Miss' **Carol Ross**, the USA earned the gold medal with a perfect 4-0 record.

JWCQ

- Coached by then-University of Colorado head coach **Ceal Barry**, the 2004 USA Junior World Championship Qualifying Team rolled through its FIBA Americas opponents on its way to a perfect 5-0 record and the gold medal in Mayaguez, Puerto Rico, qualifying the United States for the 2005 FIBA Junior World Championship. 1984 Olympic gold medalist **Lea Henry** (Georgia State) and 1999 NCAA champion **Carolyn Peck** (Florida) assisted Barry on the sidelines.

U18

- Formerly known as the Junior World Championship Qualifying Tournament, the FIBA Americas U18 Championship serves as the qualification tournament for the FIBA U19 World Championship (formerly the Junior World Championship). At the 2006 U18's, the USA was piloted by DePaul's **Doug Bruno** and assisted by Hartford's **Jennifer Rizzotti** and Northern Illinois' **Carol Owens**, as the team rolled through its competition for a 4-0 record and the gold medal in Colorado Springs, Colo.

U19

- Formerly the Junior World Championship, FIBA made the name change for the event in time for the 2005 U19 World Championship. The U.S. squad, coached by Goestenkers and assisted by Legette-Jack and Ross, collected the gold medal in Tunis, Tunisia, as the U.S. finished with an 8-0 record. Prior to the U19 Worlds, the USA split a pair of exhibition games against Hungary's U19 World Championship Team in Budapest.

U20

- Michigan State's **Joanne P. McCallie** led the 2006 USA U20 National Team to a gold medal at the 2006 FIBA Americas U20 Championship in Mexico City, Mexico. McCallie was assisted by California's **Joanne Boyle** and Furman's **Sam Dixon**. The competition, formerly known as the World Championship For Young Women Qualifying Tournament, serves as a qualification tournament for the FIBA U21 World Championship (formerly the World Championship For Young Women).

WUG

- The USA, which was coached by Harvard's **Kathy Delaney-Smith**, earned the 2005 World University Games gold medal with an unblemished 7-0 record in Izmir, Turkey. Delaney-Smith was assisted by LSU's **Pokey Chatman** and Boston College's **Cathy Inglese**.

ARIZONA STATE

Did You Know ... Former ASU standout **Ryneldi Becenti** was a member of the bronze medal winning 1993 USA World University Games Team that competed in Buffalo, New York. Additionally, four Sun Devils participated in the U.S. Olympic Festival, upon which the current USA Basketball Youth Development Festival is based. **Kym Hampton** was on the 1981 USA West Team that finished in fourth place, the following summer **Linn Henley's** West squad earned the silver medal, in 1991 **Frozena Jerro** and the West claimed bronze and in 1994 the West, featuring **Tamika Matlock**, finished with the silver medal.

DYMOND SIMON

- Member of the 2005 USA Youth Development Festival Blue Team that earned a 5-0 record to clinch the gold medal.
- Tied the Festival all-time single-game record for most free throws made with 11 against White, also shot a perfect 11-of-11 from the line in that contest to take the No. 1 spot among all-time single-game free throw percentage leaders.
- Finished the Festival ranked fifth among all-time Festival participants for most field goals attempted (75) and tied for fifth for most free throws made (20).
- Ranked third among all 2005 Festival participants for scoring (16.2 ppg.), 3-point field goal percentage (.208) and 3-point field goals made per game (1.0), fourth for free throw percentage (.870), tied for seventh for assists (2.0 apg.) and steals (2.4 spg.) and eighth for field goal percentage (.373).
- Scored in double digits in all five games, including 22 points over White in preliminary play and 18 points against White in the gold medal game.

Did You Know ... Former Arkansas standout **Christy Smith** helped lead the 1997 USA Basketball Women's World University Games Team to the gold medal with a perfect 6-0 record. Smith averaged 3.5 ppg. and a team high 3.3 apg. en route to the title. More recently **Shameka Christon** aided the USA to a gold medal at the 2002 World Championship For Young Women Qualifying Tournament and a bronze at the 2001 FIBA Junior World Championship.

- Member of the 2002 USA Basketball Youth Development Festival South Team that claimed the silver medal with a 2-3 record.

AUBURN

Did You Know ... Auburn University head coach **Nell Fortner** compiled an overall 101-14 record as the 1997-2000 USA Basketball Women's Senior National Team head coach and boasts an overall 153-14 record on the sidelines for U.S. teams. The 2000 USA Basketball National Coach of the Year, Fortner's U.S. head coaching tenure was highlighted by gold medals and perfect records at the 1998 World Championship (9-0) and 2000 Olympic Games (8-0). She got her USA Basketball start as an assistant coach for the historic 1995-96 USA Basketball Women's Senior National Team that compiled a 52-0 record leading up to the '96 Olympics and featured former Auburn standout **Ruthie Bolton**, USA Basketball's 1991 Female Athlete of the Year. A two-time Olympian, in addition to her '96 gold, Bolton was on the 2000 Olympic squad coached by Fortner. One of 18 finalists for the 1992 Olympic team, Bolton collected gold at the 1998 FIBA World Championship after earning bronze at the '94 Worlds and won gold at the 1994 Goodwill Games, 1993 World Championship Qualifying Tournament, 1991 World University Games and 1986 U.S. Olympic Festival.

Did You Know ... While no Baylor athlete is known to have competed on a USA Basketball national team, Baylor head coach **Kim Mulkey** competed on her share of USA squads, including the 1984 U.S. Olympic Team that earned the gold medal in Los Angeles. In addition to her Olympic gold, Mulkey earned gold at the 1983 Pan American Games, 1984 R. William Jones Cup and 1981 U.S. Olympic Festival (South Team), while earning silver at the 1983 FIBA World Championship. Mulkey also toured Yugoslavia as a member of the 1981 USA Junior National Team and helped the U.S. national team to a first place finish at the 1982 Ferenc Hepp Memorial Tournament in Budapest, Hungary.

However, in 2005 head coach **Cathy Inglese** was an assistant to Harvard's Kathy Delaney-Smith and the USA World University Games Team. The squad, comprised of top collegians, earned the gold medal with a perfect 7-0 record in Izmir, Turkey.

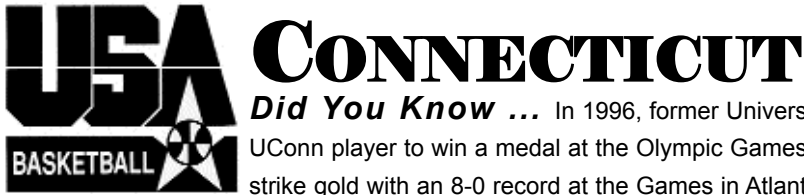

Did You Know ... In 1996, former University of Connecticut star **Rebecca Lobo** became the first UConn player to win a medal at the Olympic Games when she helped the 1996 U.S. Women's Olympic Team strike gold with an 8-0 record at the Games in Atlanta. Additionally, Lobo's teammate on UConn's 1995 NCAA championship team **Kara Wolters** helped the United States capture gold medals at the 1998 World Championship and 2000 Olympic Games, where **Geno Auriemma** served as an assistant coach. Wolters also was the youngest member of the bronze medal winning 1994 USA Basketball Women's World Championship Team, which defeated host Australia in the bronze medal game. **Sue Bird** was the youngest member of the gold medal winning 2002 USA Women's World Championship Team that went 9-0 en route to the gold medal in China and she returned to the senior level, along with **Diana Taurasi**, as the U.S. Women's Olympic Team captured its third straight gold medal with a perfect 8-0 record in Athens. Bird and Taurasi teamed up again in 2006 as members of the USA World Championship Team that posted an 8-1 record and claimed the bronze at the FIBA World Championship that saw Bird finish as the tournament's assist leader and Taurasi as the leader for 3-pointers. Prior to her Olympic achievement, Taurasi was a member of the 2001 USA Junior World Championship Team that was coached by Auriemma and claimed a bronze with a 6-1 record. Her play earned Taurasi All-FIBA Junior World Championship Team honors.

USA GEORGIA

Did You Know ... Two of the most decorated athletes in USA Basketball history hailed from the University of Georgia, five-time Olympian **Teresa Edwards** and three-time Olympian **Katrina McClain**.

Edwards became the youngest American athlete to win a women's basketball gold medal as an 18-year-old at the Los Angeles Games in 1984. She returned to help lead the '88 squad, which included McClain, to gold and in 1992 the duo were on the bronze medal winning U.S. Olympic Team. In McClain's third and final Olympics in 1996, she and Edwards helped catapult the USA women back to the top spot, winning the gold medal. Prior to the start of the Games, Edwards took the Olympic Oath during Opening Ceremonies on behalf of all the athletes in the Games. Edwards then did what nobody in the basketball world had ever done - earn a fourth gold medal - and became the oldest woman to capture an Olympic basketball gold in Sydney. Edwards, who is the most decorated Olympic basketball athlete in history, male or female, served on the USA Basketball Women's Collegiate Committee from 2001-04 and currently serves on the USA Basketball Women's Senior National Team Committee, helping to select USA Basketball's next generation of Olympic and World Championship team members. In addition to their Olympic and numerous other successes with USA Basketball, Edwards and McClain teamed up on a trio of USA World Championship squads, capturing gold in 1986 and 1990 and bronze in 1994 when both were selected to the five-member All-World Championship Team.

In addition to Edwards and McClain, recent UGa grad **Christi Thomas** excelled in the international arena. She was a member of the 2003 USA World Championship For Young Women Team that captured the gold medal with a 7-1 record in Croatia. After averaging a team fifth best 7.6 ppg. and a team high 6.8 rpg., Thomas scored 13 points and a team high eight rebounds in the gold medal game, collecting All-FIBA World Championship For Young Women Tournament Team honors in the process.

Did You Know ... Legendary former Louisiana State head coach **Sue Gunter** was on a pair of U.S. Olympic Team staffs and rolled up a 32-11 (.744) overall record as a coach of various USA Basketball teams.

In 1976 Gunter was an assistant coach for the first women's Olympic squad and assisted the USA to a 3-2 record and the silver medal in Montreal. Returning to the sidelines in 1980, Gunter headed the U.S. Olympic Team to a 6-1 record and the gold medal at the 1980 FIBA Olympic Qualifying Tournament, signifying to the world that the USA would be one of the top medal contenders at the '80 Games. However, Gunter and the U.S. did not compete in the 1980 Moscow Olympics. Numerous LSU players have represented their country in the past. Most notable among the recent standouts are **Seimone Augustus** and **Sylvia Fowles**, who were on the 2006 USA Basketball Women's Senior National Team that earned the Australia-hosted 2006 Opals World Challenge title in April. Augustus went on to be named to the 2006 USA World Championship Team that, despite suffering a setback from Russia in the semifinals, rebounded to earn the bronze medal with an 8-1 mark. Augustus, the 2003 USA Basketball Female Athlete of the Year, also helped lead the U.S. to a gold medal at the 2003 FIBA World Championship For Young Women, earning tournament MVP honors in the process. In 2005 head coach **Pokey Chatman** was an assistant to Harvard's Kathy Delaney-Smith and the USA World University Games Team. The squad, comprised of top collegians, including Augustus and Fowles, earned the gold medal with a perfect 7-0 record in Izmir, Turkey.

OSU head coach **Jim Foster** earned 2003 USA Basketball Developmental Coach of the Year honors for leading the 2003 USA World Championship For Young Women Team to a gold medal and a 7-1 record in Sibenik, Croatia. He also coached the U.S. squad to a 4-0 record over Australia and eventual silver medalist Brazil in exhibition games in Boston. The summer of '03 marked Foster's ninth coaching assignment for USA Basketball, his fourth as a head coach, and he now boasts an overall record of 50-10 (.833) on the international sidelines for the United States. Garnering great experience **Jessica Davenport** last spring was one of three returning college players (LSU's Sylvia Fowles and Tennessee's Candace Parker were the others) to be invited to participate alongside Smith, as well as other Olympians and professional players on the 2006 USA Basketball Women's National Team that traveled to Cairns and Canberra, Australia, and returned home with a 4-1 slate and the 2006 Opals World Challenge crown.

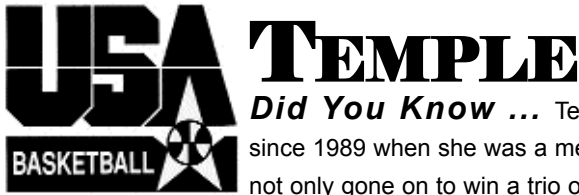

USA TEMPLE

Did You Know ... Temple University head coach **Dawn Staley** has competed for USA Basketball since 1989 when she was a member of the USA Junior World Championship Team. Since that time she has not only gone on to win a trio of Olympic golds (1996, 2000 and 2004) and two World Championship golds (1998 and 2002), she has also collected a gold medal at the 1999 U.S. Olympic Cup, 1994 Goodwill Games, 1993 World Championship Qualifying Tournament, 1992 R. William Jones Cup and the 1991 World University Games. A three-time USA World Championship Team member, Staley also brought home a bronze medal from the 1994 World Championship. Adding an impressive line to her already impressive resume, Staley was voted by her peers, other 2004 U.S. Olympic Team captains, to lead the United States delegation into the 2004 Olympic Opening Ceremony. Staley in 2006 began the second stage of her USA Basketball career as an assistant coach for the 2006 USA World Championship Team that posted an 8-1 slate at the FIBA World Championship and returned with the bronze medal. Additionally, due to the timing of the WNBA Draft, Staley assumed the reins of the USA Senior National Team for the first game of the 2006 Australia-hosted Opals World Challenge and piloted the squad to a victory as the only member of the USA coaching staff on the sidelines. USA head coach **Anne Donovan** of the Seattle Storm and assistant **Mike Thibault** of the Connecticut Sun arrived in Australia in time for the second game as Staley turned the squad back over to Donovan.

TENNESSEE

Did You Know ... University of Tennessee head coach **Pat Summitt** is one of three women to have competed on either an Olympic or World Championship Team and returned to USA Basketball as a member of a senior national team coaching staff (Anne Donovan, Marian Washington). Summitt was a player on the USA's first women's Olympic squad in 1976, which claimed the silver medal, and also played on the 1975 USA World Championship Team which finished in eighth place. She returned to the sidelines for USA Basketball, coaching the 1984 U.S. Olympic Team to the gold medal and was the head coach for the silver medal winning 1983 USA Women's World Championship Team.

Tennessee is the only school that can boast of representation on all eight U.S. Women's Olympic squads. Lady Vol Olympic alums include **Cindy Brogdon** (1976), **Daedra Charles** (1992), **Bridgette Gordon** (1988), **Lea Henry** (1984), **Chamique Holdscraw** (2000), **Nikki McCray** (1996, 2000), **Carla McGhee** (1996), **Cindy Noble** (1980, 1984), **Jill Rankin** (1980), **Patricia Roberts** (1976), **Pat Head Summitt** (1976) and **Holly Warlick** (1980). **Tamika Catchings**, who earned a gold medal with the 2002 USA World Championship and 2004 Olympic teams helped Tennessee's Olympic streak continue in Athens.

While historically Tennessee can't claim the most members of World Championship teams (Nashville Business College and Wayland Baptist College each have 13 athletes on the USA's all-time roster), in the modern era Tennessee has had more athletes compete at the Worlds for the U.S. than any other school. In addition to two-time USA World Championship Team member Catchings, who earned a bronze in 2006 in Brazil playing alongside **Candace Parker** and **Michelle Snow**, UT's 10 USA World Championship members include Charles (1994 / bronze), Dena Head (1994 / bronze), Holdscraw (1998 / gold), McCray (1998 / gold), McGhee (1994 / bronze), Noble (1983 / silver) and Warlick (1979 / gold).

Additionally, Plonsky was the chair of the USA Basketball Women's Collegiate Committee, which selects players and coaches for various college-aged squads like the U21 World Championship, U19 World Championship and World University Games teams. Recent UT grad **Stacy Stephens** played a pair of summers for USA Basketball, earning bronze at the 2001 FIBA Junior World Championship and gold at the 2002 COPABA World Championship For Young Women Qualifying Tournament.

Did You Know ...

While numerous Bruins have donned a USA Basketball uniform in the past, the trio of **Denise Curry**, **Ann Meyers** (Drysdale) and **Natalie Williams**, have represented the United States in four Olympics and six World Championships. Meyers-Drysdale was a member of the first women's U.S. Olympic basketball team in 1976 and brought home the silver medal from Montreal. Curry missed her shot at a medal in 1980 after the United States did not participate in the Olympic Games which were held in Moscow. However, four years later Curry and her Olympic teammates collected the USA's first women's Olympic basketball gold medal in Los Angeles. Most recently Williams helped the USA capture gold at the 2000 Games in Sydney. In World Championship play, Meyers-Drysdale was on a young squad which finished eighth in the '75 Worlds in Cali, Colombia. Meyers-Drysdale returned to the 1979 World Championship and, along with Curry, aided the U.S. to a gold medal turnaround in Seoul. The United States, which has medaled in every World Championship since 1979, earned a silver with the help of Curry at the 1983 Worlds in Sao Paulo, Brazil. Williams aided USA Basketball to a pair of gold medals in the 1998 and 2002 FIBA World Championships. In addition to the three Olympic and World Championship team players, legendary former UCLA head coach **Billie Moore** was an assistant coach for the 1975 USA Worlds squad and returned the following year to coach the U.S. to the silver medal in the inaugural Olympic women's basketball tournament.

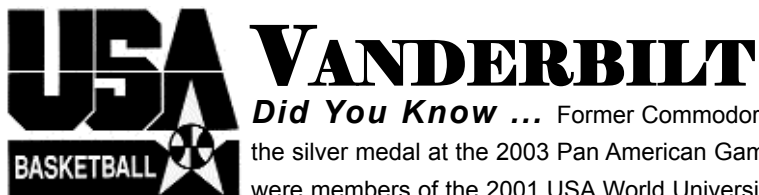

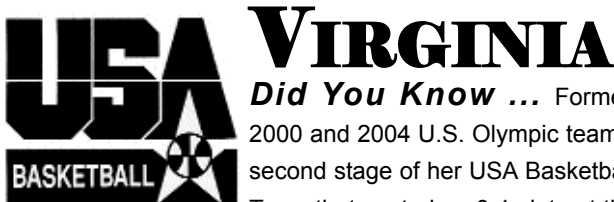

Additionally, due to the timing of the WNBA Draft, Staley assumed the reins of the USA Senior National Team for the first game of the 2006 Australia-hosted Opals World Challenge and piloted the squad to a victory as the only member of the USA coaching staff on the sidelines. USA head coach **Anne Donovan** of the Seattle Storm and assistant **Mike Thibault** of the Connecticut Sun arrived in Australia in time for the second game as Staley turned the squad back over to Donovan. A co-captain on the '00 squad, Staley was named captain of the 2004 U.S. team and was voted by her peers, the other U.S. Olympic Team captains, to carry the U.S. flag and lead the United States delegation into the 2004 Opening Ceremony in Athens. Staley also helped the United States capture gold medals at the 1998 and 2002 World Championships and finished with a bronze at the 1994 World Championship. Cavalier head coach **Debbie Ryan**, who piloted the 2003 USA Pan American Games Team to a silver medal in the Dominican Republic, the 2001 USA World University Games Team to the gold medal in Beijing and was named USA Basketball's 2001 Development Coach of the Year, has been involved in USA Basketball as a committee member as well as a coach. Ryan was a member of the USA Basketball Games Committee for Women and the USA Basketball Women's Player Subcommittee during the 1988-92 quadrennium, helping to select athletes for numerous competitions including the 1990 USA World Championship and 1992 U.S. Olympic teams. Most recently Ryan took a team of collegians to the 2003 Pan American Games where the U.S. faced seasoned veterans on national teams and came away with the silver medal.
